Dear Parish Family,

As I write this, I am aware that many of you are learning the sad news that Fr Philip Thirlwell died in the early hours of this morning. Fr Philip was a holy and devoted priest, deeply prayerful, and committed to a life of justice and peace. Fr Philip faithfully celebrated the Eucharist at the cathedral on Thursday mornings until very recently. I will miss his wisdom, his radiating peace, his poetry, and his companionship. We offer our love and prayers to Margaret, and their family, Anne, Rosemary, Kathryn, and their families. **Rest eternal grant to him, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon him.**

I'm looking forward this Sunday to Chilcott's 'A Little Jazz Mass' at 10.00am at the Cathedral. For those who saw my red boots last weekend and wondered if there would be green shows for Trinity, I'm sorry to disappoint you! I am also looking forward to Evensong, where our choir will sing Peter Guy's new setting of the Te Deum.

With our doors open once more, it has been wonderful to welcome a steady stream of visitors to the Cathedral. Unfortunately, until water damaged carpet on the stairs is replaced, the Tower climb is still not available. The Cathedral will remain open during the day on this basis until the requirements around cleaning ease further.

If you have not yet had the opportunity to look at the proposed Harbour to Cathedral Corridor, I encourage you to do so. In your pewslips you will find information from Newcastle City Council about this concept, creating a view corridor and stairs from Hunter Street to King Street. One of our Cathedral Canons contacted me this week, to say a retired priest in Ballarat Diocese had said how greatly he values the Cathedral's online prayer ministry. Finally, this week's poem is a favourite¹ by Rowan Williams. The title, '*Rublev*' refers the famous icon by Andrei Rublev, written in the fifteenth century. Rublev's icon, 'The Hospitality of Abraham' is also known as 'The Trinity' and often used as a visually in reference to the Trinity. Williams' poem, replete with disturbing imagery of God taking the literal colours of birth, death, pain, and suffering reminds us that God is not distant from us, nor unfamiliar with our struggles. In the end, God who is with us, sits and talks and eats with us, as we share at the table.

One day, God walked in, pale from the grey steppe, slit-eyed against the wind, and stopped, said, Colour me, breathe your blood into my mouth. I said, Here is the blood of all our people, these are their bruises, blue and purple, gold, brown, and pale green wash of death. These (god) are the chromatic pains of flesh, I said, I trust I shall make you blush, O I shall stain you with the scars of birth For ever, I shall root you in the wood, under the sun shall bake you bread of beechmast, never let you forth To the white desert, to the starving sand. But we shall sit and speak around one table, share one food, one earth. Row

City of Newcastle seeks community feedback on Harbour to Cathedral Corridor

City of Newcastle is inviting feedback from the community on the Harbour to Cathedral Corridor (Stairway to Heaven) concept, which proposes to link Christ Church Cathedral to the Harbour via a grand staircase.

The concept seeks to open-up connections and view lines from the Harbour foreshore and Hunter Street Mall to Christ Church Cathedral, aligning with long held strategic objectives of City of Newcastle and the NSW Government to connect the city to the harbour.

City of Newcastle Lord Mayor Nuatali Nelmes said the concept is a once-in-a lifetime opportunity to create a landmark public space for the city.

"City of Newcastle will soon demolish the 59 year old Mall Car Park due to its poor structural condition which brings about the chance to open the vista to the harbour and protect iconic views of the Cathedral for future generations," the Lord Mayor said.

"With recent developments in Hunter Street Mall, we now have a unique opportunity to provide residents and visitors to Newcastle with a world-class public space to enjoy.

"While we are in the early stages of assessing the viability of the concept, we want to determine the community's support for this new public space which would feature a 93 metre long and 20 metre public space and stairway extending from Hunter Street to King Street, enabling pedestrian access, active shop fronts, landings and courtyards along the proposed staircase to gather and meet."

City of Newcastle Director Governance David Clarke said a feasibility assessment found that an integrated approach to delivering the concept which involves City of Newcastle and Iris Capital owned land would provide the best outcome for the city. "This concept aims to provide a beautiful public asset for our community whilst retaining 380 public carparking spaces in a central location of our revitalised city," Mr Clarke said.

"Importantly, this concept provides the only opportunity to preserve the view corridor to the Cathedral due to Iris Capital's East End Stage 3 development, which in its current form, would obscure the line of sight from the Harbour to the Cathedral.


"City of Newcastle is working with Iris Capital on an in-principle agreement on the terms and conditions about how we might progress on the concept."

Glen Spicer, Director EJE Architects said key property and development organisations in Newcastle including The Property Council and the Urban Design Review Panel (URDP) support the concept.

"Barney Collins of EJE Architects envisioned this concept more than 15 years ago. Now with recent opportunities presenting themselves, it provides the perfect chance to maintain the heritage of the area while enhancing public and visual amenity of the space in a sustainable way," Mr Spicer said.

"The Property Council and URDP both fully support the City of Newcastle in this exciting endeavour."

Assets Register – Important cope Last week this was the last cope to be recorded Bishop Francis de Witt Batty's Cope and Mitre







This portrait of Bishop Batty is amongst the Cultural Collection of the University of Newcastle and shows Bishop de Witt Batty in this cope and mitre.

When recording the vestments all attributes are described and recorded which takes some time for team members. The material has to be identified and parts of the cope have different names. The "collar" with the crown on royal blue velvet is part of *the Orphrey* and as it flows through to the front, symbols often appear on it. The crossed keys here represent St Peter and the keys of heaven. The band that joins the two sides across the chest is called *the Morse*.

There are many symbols for the Blessed Virgin Mary and on *the mitre* is one of these called "Rose without a Thorn. The mitre is in an excellent condition but the cope needs expert repairs in some areas.

Bishop de Witt Batty was the 7th Anglican Bishop of Newcastle from 1931 until he retired in 1958. He died in 1961 and his ashes were interred with Bishop William Tyrrell (1807 – 1899) first Bishop of Newcastle at the Anglican Cemetery Morpeth. Two of our team members Gai Le Marchant and Elizabeth Price were confirmed by Bishop de Witt Batty!

ABM EMERGENCY APPEAL FOR GAZA

Conflict in Gaza has escalated this week, with at least 67 Gazans killed during Israeli air attacks. At least seven people have also been killed by Hamas rockets fired into Israel. Hundreds more have been injured and many homes destroyed.

The escalation was triggered by two recent developments. Firstly, Israeli settlers have lodged a case in Israel's Supreme Court to evict a number of Palestinian families from their homes in Sheikh Jarrah, a mainly Palestinian neighbourhood of East Jerusalem. Secondly, Palestinians and Israeli police clashed at a Muslim holy site, al-Aqsa Mosque, last Monday.

The escalation of conflict occurs as Gaza struggles with a new wave of COVID, reaching 1000 new cases per day in April. As ABM partner Al Ahli Hospital observed, 'There are not enough beds or oxygen for patients.'

For those ABM supporters wishing to assist families affected by the latest conflict, ABM has launched an appeal. Funds will go to ABM's partner, the Al Ahli Hospital, for services for those affected in Gaza.

QR Codes – Frequently Asked Questions

What is the QR Code?

QR codes are a common of electronic check-in system which operate like barcodes, with information that can be read by a smartphone camera.

Why do I need to use it?

It is a hygienic, contactless way of recording your attendance for faster contact tracing. At the moment, it is mandatory for attendees at weddings and funerals. We expect that it will soon be mandatory for places of worship.

How does the QR Code work?

Open your smartphone camera and point it at the code square. A notification should come up on the top of the screen on your phone, taking you to the Service NSW App. Login with your details and follow the prompts.

How do I get the App?

You can download the Service NSW App from the App Store.

I've checked in. It says I need to show a member of staff. What do I do now?

Please show your phone screen to a sidesperson, who will mark your name off the list if you have pre-registered or note your attendance for tally purposes.

Can I register multiple people on my device?

Yes. You can register dependents. If you register other people with you, if contact tracing is required, you will be contacted on behalf of these people.

I don't have a smartphone./ My smartphone doesn't recognise the QR Code. What do I do?

Please see one of the sidespeople who will record your attendance on the online form. Thanks for your patience as we learn the new system.

Do I still need to register to attend worship?

It's helpful if we have an idea beforehand about numbers attending services. We'd hate for you to turn up and for there not to be a space for you!

I forgot to check out! Is that a problem?

No. :)

What happens to my personal information?

Your information is sent directly to Service NSW. This means it is readily available for NSW Health to access if it becomes necessary.

Where can I find more information? This website is helpful, <u>https://www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/covid-safe/customer-record-keeping/qr-codes</u> with a handy video at the end of the page. Please ask the Dean, a Warden, or a Parish Council member if you have any concerns.
