

Dear Parish Family,

I begin by giving thanks for the life and ministry of Les Forester, priest of this Diocese, who died during this week. I know that many of you have been holding Les and Jennifer in prayer, and I know how deeply they appreciated these prayers. It's expected that the funeral will be at All Saints Nelson Bay. *Rest eternal grant to him, O Lord, and let light perpetual shine upon him.*

Tuesday is the Feast of Peter and Paul, Apostles and Martyrs, and we are celebrating St Peter's Hamilton Patronal Festival at 11.00am on Tuesday. All are welcome at the Mass, and then afterwards at The Bennett Hotel for lunch. This is an important and significant celebration within the life of our parish, and I encourage you to attend.

My thanks again to the Reverend Dr Julia Perry for presiding and preaching at the Cathedral on Sunday, as I preached at St Alban's Muswellbrook for their Patronal Festival. I bring greetings from Reverend Angela Peverell and the Parish of Muswellbrook. In the pewslip, you can see pictures of the green vestments which were our gift to Angela when she left the parish, and I was humbled to have the opportunity to bless at the Patronal Festival.

There's a lot of other news in the pewslip this week, so rather than repeating it here, I encourage you to make a cuppa and download and read the pewslip. There is information about *The Coming of the Light* celebrations, The Order of St John service on Sunday evening at the Cathedral, Sea Sunday celebrations, and new sets of offertory envelopes.

We continue to closely watch the news of the COVID-19 cases in Sydney. At this point, we are under no new restrictions, but if the situation changes I will send an update. As I said last week, *it is essential that you check in when attending worship (or any other place).* There are sign in sheets available for those who don't have mobile phones, or whose mobile phones have difficulty with the QR Code. A reminder too that the Eucharist is celebrated at the Cathedral at 8.30am Monday-Friday, as well as on Tuesday and Thursday at 11.00am at St Peter's Hamilton. 




GIFT FROM ST PETER'S AND CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL

Would you be interested in having fun and helping children during the school holidays?


I am working with our hub churches to organise our usual Kids' Club at St John's Cooks Hill in July. I would love your support in facilitating our parish family ministries working together to thrive.

1 July 2021 - the 150th Anniversary of

THE COMING OF THE LIGHT



Coming of the Light 150 Years Celebration steering committee members have been busy planning the 150th anniversary celebrations to be held from 1 to 4 July 2021, with (L-R) Lana Auda, Ivy Lewis and Aunty Dr Rose Elu, along with Kerry Klimm (Flashblak) and Dita Southwood (from Brisbane City Council)

Anglicanism is practised widely in the Torres Strait, with local Torres Strait Islander Anglican Non-Geographical Parish members largely worshipping at Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Fortitude Valley.

While looking forward to the celebrations, parishioner and 2021 Queensland Senior Australian of the Year Aunty Dr Rose Elu said that it is important for all Anglicans to understand that Jesus was present in the local people before the Bible came to the Torres Strait.

"Our spirituality lies in the sea, sky and land and since time immemorial our people have believed in a creator, but we did not know that the creator was the Christian God," Aunty Dr Rose said. "The Coming of the Light made that connection, but we had already received God before the arrival of the English missionaries, as God was already with us.

"As July approaches, I am most looking forward to celebrating our unity as one Body of Christ and learning from each other, along with the local traditional custodians of the land in Brisbane."

LIGHT CAME, LIGHT CONTINUES TO COME, AND THE LIGHT WILL CONTINUE TO SHINE.

The Reverend Canon Victor Joseph, Principal Wontulp-Bi-Buya College 1 July, 2021 marks the 150th anniversary of The Coming of the Light to the Torres Strait Islands. The London Missionary Society with Melanesian leaders landed on the shores of Erub (Darnley Island) and introduced the Bible to the people who lived there. This event, The Coming of the Light, is an integral part of cultural identity to Torres Strait Islander peoples and there is much joy on the anniversary each year.

When the ship, Surprise, landed on Erub in 1871 it brought with it the message of Jesus, who heralded a way of peace and non-violence. The Revd Canon Victor Joseph says, "The best thing it brought is that violence began to cease among the islands." These visitors to the Torres Strait were welcomed in peace. The tribal leaders called for no weapons, receiving them in peace, open to what they were bringing.

It must be stated that the LMS missionaries did not bring God to the Torres Strait, rather the message of Jesus, through the Bible. God was on both sides of the beach that day, and since time immemorial.

Aunty McRose Elu recounts a story of when she was a child, asking her father, "Why they talking about the light, weren't our people already in the light? Why are they saying it was a coming of the light to the Torres Strait?" She goes onto say, "They explained to me it wasn't in the way of thinking that we were in the darkness, that we came out of darkness into light, it was like them bringing the light to us and we, bringing the light to them, and we also tell them, we have a light in our own surroundings, we have a spirituality, we have things that we believe in."

The celebration Coming of the Light is an important anniversary for the national Anglican church. It invites us to reflect on our national history, on the good and the bad. It invites us to celebrate mission and ministry, particularly within the Torres Strait, and it invites us to listen to the church in the Torres Strait, which is made up of vibrant communities of hope.

As Rev'd Victor says, "The light continues to come", and the 150th anniversary of the Coming of The Light is an opportunity for us to look for the Light, welcome it, and celebrate in joy.

The Collect of the Day Almighty God, you have given to the people of the Islands of the Torres Strait the glorious light of the Gospel of Christ: mercifully grant that we may always walk in the light of his love, and give us the strength and unifying power of your Holy Spirit to spread that light and enlarge your kingdom in the hearts of all people. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

We all know and see the banners that Rae Richards made and hang in our cathedral. In the vestry hang many more that represent different organisations within the Diocese. Some are from the past, and some are still used for special celebrations, feast days and processions. Below are some that have so far been recorded.

The Mothers' Union has branches in Anglican churches all over Australia and indeed other countries. Its AIM is the advancement of the Christian religion in the sphere of marriage and family life. The Five Objects are: To promote and support married life; To encourage parents in their role to develop the faith of their children; To maintain a worldwide fellowship of Christians united in prayer, worship and service; To promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children; To help those whose family life has met with adversity. The cathedral branch meets at the Cathedral on the third Wednesday of the month at 10.00am.



In the Diocese of Melbourne, the record of the all the banners in that Diocese have been compiled in a book and in the foreword, the former Archbishop Philip Freier begins: The banners and the women! Though men are now welcome to participate, the biding tradition is that of women of the Anglican Church......

We have three for MU. The others recorded so far are: The Girls' Friendly Society, The Chapter of St Aidan of Lindisfarne, a cathedral one (there is another wonderful one in the sanctuary of the High Altar) and The Guild of the Servants of the Sanctuary. QR Codes – Frequently Asked Questions

What is the QR Code?

QR codes are a common of electronic check-in system which operate like barcodes, with information that can be read by a smartphone camera.

Why do I need to use it?

It is a hygienic, contactless way of recording your attendance for faster contact tracing. At the moment, it is mandatory for attendees at weddings and funerals. We expect that it will soon be mandatory for places of worship.

How does the QR Code work?

Open your smartphone camera and point it at the code square. A notification should come up on the top of the screen on your phone, taking you to the Service NSW App. Login with your details and follow the prompts.

How do I get the App?

You can download the Service NSW App from the App Store.

I've checked in. It says I need to show a member of staff. What do I do now?

Please show your phone screen to a sidesperson, who will mark your name off the list if you have pre-registered or note your attendance for tally purposes.

Can I register multiple people on my device?

Yes. You can register dependents. If you register other people with you, if contact tracing is required, you will be contacted on behalf of these people.

I don't have a smartphone./ My smartphone doesn't recognise the QR Code. What do I do?

Please see one of the sidespeople who will record your attendance on the online form. Thanks for your patience as we learn the new system.

Do I still need to register to attend worship?

It's helpful if we have an idea beforehand about numbers attending services. We'd hate for you to turn up and for there not to be a space for you!

I forgot to check out! Is that a problem?

No. :)

What happens to my personal information?

Your information is sent directly to Service NSW. This means it is readily available for NSW Health to access if it becomes necessary.

Where can I find more information? This website is helpful, <u>https://www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/covid-safe/customer-record-keeping/qr-codes</u> with a handy video at the end of the page. Please ask the Dean, a Warden, or a Parish Council member if you have any concerns.
