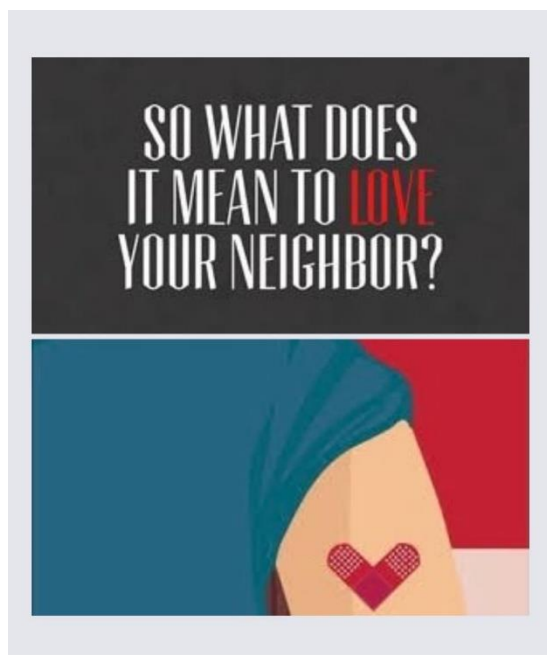

Dear Parish Family,

I'm sure that you, like me, have watched with prayerful concern the rise in COVID-19 infections in the Hunter region. I am thankful for all our frontline workers, healthcare workers, and those involved with contract tracing, along with so many others who are working to keep our communities safe and well. In good news, it would seem that this week there is talk of lockdown ending a week earlier than predicted, such has been the increase in vaccinations. As I've written previously, when I know what this will look like for us as we gather to worship, I will let you know.

The Cathedral of Christ the King Ballarat posted this image on Facebook this week, and I thought it was a beautiful way to demonstrate why being vaccinated, if you're able, is an action of love for one another.

Finally, this week's poem is an antiphon by Hildegard of Bingen, whose feast day was 17th September. Hildegard is renowned as a visionary, contemplative, theologian, and musician. This antiphon, invoking her understanding of the presence of the Living Light, also links us to the celebration of the Feast of Michael and all Angels on Wednesday 29th September. In 2019, whilst on Long Service Leave in the UK, David and I visited 'The Angel of the North', and Hildegard's antiphon, and this photo from our visit, remind me of all the times, as the write of the Letter to the Hebrews states, we have entertained angels unawares. 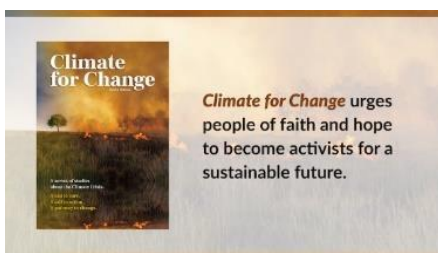

There are six figures in the Niche Reredos Statues. There is some confusion in all six as to who they are as seen in Bronwyn Orrock's research.

Below are the three on the southern side.



SOUTHERN SIDE

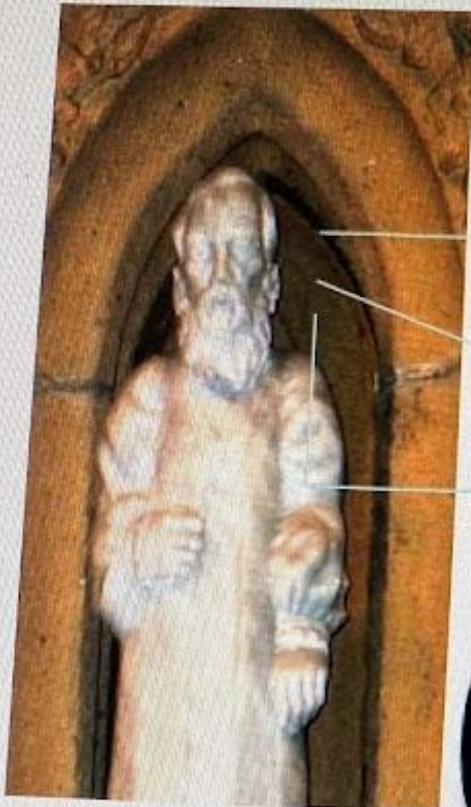
*“The outer sides portray (south) Bishops Dr Broughton, Dr Selwyn & Dr Peterson. Here is the confusion – is the spelling of names in the 1910-12 references correct, or was it meant to be Bishop John Coleridge Patteson, first Bishop of Melanesia, great linguist and colleague of Bishop Selwyn? Using physical similarity could it possibly be Newcastle's Bishop Josiah Brown Pearson? Or indeed could it be Bishop John Paterson, Archbishop of Glasgow 1632-1708 at the start of the English Civil War? Further research is certainly warranted.” **

In the Chancel are located the Canons' Stalls, one of which is the Patteson Stall whose 150th anniversary of death was commemorated on 20 September 2021 (see Mission news)

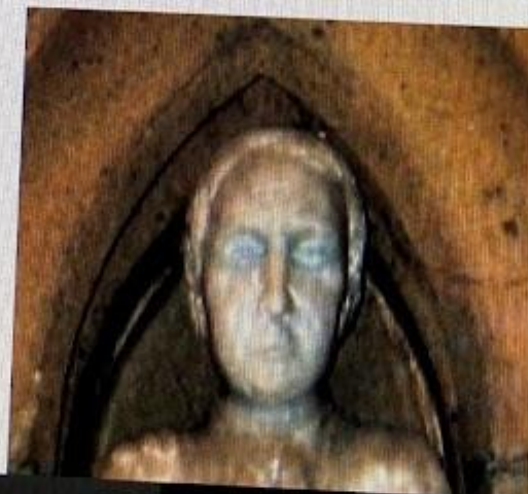

150th ANNIVERSARY OF DEATH OF BISHOP PATTESON IN THE SOLOMON ISLANDS

"We remember Bishop Patteson's martyrdom, his courage and faithfulness, and give thanks to God for the Church of Melanesia which lives out his legacy." These words, spoken by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Reverend Justin Welby, marked the beginning of a special pilgrimage within the Diocese of Exeter to commemorate the life and work of Bishop Patteson who died in the Solomon Islands on 20 September 1871. Patteson sailed from his home town in Devon to begin a mission to the islands of Melanesia over 170 years ago.

"We are invited into a lifelong spiritual journey with God - to be pilgrims, encounter Him in new ways and places, wherever we go and whoever we are", concluded the Archbishop. You can read more and see photos at the Archbishop's Facebook page here

Bishop John Coleridge Patteson

The story of Bishop John Coleridge Patteson (1827-1871), the sesquicentenary of whose martyrdom we commemorate on 20 September, is intricately linked to Christ Church St Laurence.

Patteson's uncle and mentor, Rev Edward Coleridge of Eton College, was a member of the High Church group in England that supported Bishop Broughton (Bishop of Australia from 1836 and Bishop of Sydney 1847-1852) and Canon Walsh (CCSL Rector 1839-1867). One of Coleridge's colleagues at Eton was the Rev Francis Vidal, the brother of Canon George Vidal (CCSL Rector 1867-1878). (Incidentally, the poet and theologian, Samuel Taylor Coleridge (1796-1836), was Patteson's great uncle.)

Ordained a priest in 1854, Patteson offered himself to Bishop George Selwyn of New Zealand for missionary service and travelled with him to NZ in 1855. He became a priest with the Melanesian Mission from 1856 and was consecrated Bishop of Melanesia in 1861.

Patteson visited Sydney several times - in June 1856, Holy Week and Easter 1864, and October/November 1865 - to raise awareness of, and funds for, the mission. He attended Christ Church several times on each visit.

Patteson was killed at Nukapu, in the Solomon Islands, on 20 September 1871. The killing was thought to be in retaliation for the abduction, a few days earlier, of five local men and the killing of one other by slave traders (known as "blackbirders").



On the Sunday after news of the murder reached Sydney, 12 November 1871, the bells of Christ Church rang a muffled peal before morning prayer and evensong for Patteson whose mission, it was said, was “always warmly supported by the congregation”.

Funds were collected in Sydney for a memorial, including a very generous personal donation for a “figure” of the martyred bishop. However, the rules of St Andrew’s Cathedral would permit only mural monuments, so the sculpture was located instead at Christ Church. An altar tomb with recumbent figure of the bishop was designed by Edmund Blacket and carved by Henry Apperly. It was installed in August 1873 and originally stood against the north wall of the sanctuary before it was removed to the west end in 1927.

Canon Vidal wrote in 1872: “Who can tell what lessons of self-sacrifice may be learnt by future generations at the tomb of Bishop Patteson? Children will ask, and parents will tell how he lived and how he died.”

'Reframing climate and creation care communications for Christians' Zoom workshop

The free online workshop is designed for Anglican clergy and lay people.

Anglicans care about God's Creation; however, based on feedback we have received and lessons learned, the Church's messaging could be more hopeful, positive, tangible, tailored, engaging and solutions focused.

Thus, this workshop will provide participants with an alternative way to reframe climate and creation care communications for Christians who are unsure where they stand or may be ambivalent about the issue.

The workshop is especially designed for Anglican clergy and laity, communications professionals and key advocates nationally to help sharpen their advocacy communication skills, and especially the effectiveness of:

- press release and opinion piece writing
- media liaison
- campaigning and political lobbying
- homily crafting
- Bible study and small group facilitation
- community forum and panel presenting
- public lecture giving.

The workshop facilitators are The Very Rev'd Dr Peter Catt (Anglican Dean of Brisbane), Peter Branjerdporn (Anglican Church Southern Queensland) and Michelle McDonald (anglican focus and North Coast Anglican Editor) in partnership with me. (I have a very small role!)

Importantly, while the workshop will focus on climate and creation care, the key principles explored in the workshop are relevant across diverse advocacy sectors.

Cathedral Board Report September 2021

The current members of the Board are Bishop Peter Stuart (ex officio), Phil Weston (Chair), The Dean, Howard Benson (Lay Canon), Bill Jordan, Robert Sharpe (Financial Officer), and Patricia Gillard. The Board currently has vacancies to be filled from the lay and clergy Canons.

The work of the Cathedral Board is described in the Cathedral Ordinance 2012 <https://www.newcastleanglican.org.au/wp-content/uploads/2020/04/Cathedral-Ordinance-2012-13042020.pdf>

At the September meeting, the Board continued the discussion around strategic land management and responding to the Heritage Council. The Board discussed the ongoing rollout of the new Cathedral lighting programme (currently halted due to insufficient funds); repairs to tiles on the Sanctuary platform and repairs to pews; repairs to the electronic system that rings the bells; and noting other major repair work that is needed, such as the re-pointing of the East end of the Cathedral. A major restoration project will be the repair of the Historic Belfry at the West End, and work has begun on gathering the information for this.

There was discussion about roof leaks at both the Cathedral and St Peter's. Patricia Gillard had submitted an application for an emergency grant for finances towards the urgent repair of the St Michael Chapel roof. The day after the Board met, we learnt that this application had been successful – well done Patricia!

The Board is also currently in the process of developing a collections policy, and developing an active maintenance schedule, and growing independent income streams to support this work.



Request for Masks

The Diocese of Bathurst has appealed for help with masks for adults and children for communities in their region.

They write: “ Can you help with sewing and donating masks for people who are having problems accessing them, please? Cyrena Harris, a First Nations woman who lives in Dubbo, is leading an initiative of creating care packs for people in her area who either cannot afford masks and sanitiser or cannot access them due to supply problems. The packs include masks, hand sanitiser, and correct information about testing and vaccination. The Dubbo Anglican Church and the local Anglicare are supporting this important and urgent initiative. The Anglican Church at Dubbo and Anglicare would appreciate donations of homemade masks. **To ensure the masks are as effective as possible it is important to follow the Australian Government instructions on how to make a cloth mask, which can be found at <https://www.health.gov.au/resources/publications/how-to-make-cloth-mask>.**

The aim is to help everyone stay healthy. With this in mind, could you please ensure the material used is clean and has not been used for other purposes and also that you are healthy and your hands are sanitised/cleaned every time you touch the masks? Please mail the masks directly to:
