### A little bit about what's happening:

**#CHANGETHEHEART:** January 26 is a difficult time for many people across these lands now called Australia. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are feeling many emotions and are hurting, grieving, mourning, and commemorating survival, on this day. That's why gathering together to listen and learn and pray for a nation built on truth, justice, love and hope is so important.

On January 25 at 7.30pm, the Cathedral is going to be a livesite, hosting a broadcast of the National Prayer Gathering led by Aboriginal Christian Leaders to #ChangeTheHeart of Australia, hosted by Aunty Jean Phillips, Senior Aboriginal Christian Leader. There's more information about how you can be involved in the pewslip, and how you can sign up individually to watch at home.

**COMMUNITY LUNCH:** Community Lunch resumes on 30<sup>th</sup> January 2022. My thanks to Andrew Traill and Suzanne Evans and the team who have faithfully ensured the continuation of this ministry. With heightened COVID-19 infections in the community, the decision has been wisely made to return to the 'takeaway' format for the immediate future.

ALWAYS SOMETHING TO SEE: Last Sunday, as I was baptising, I saw this stunning reflection. A combination of the time, the sun, and being in the right place at the right time, meant that (as you can see) the window depicting the baptism of Jesus was reflected in the waters of the font. It's one of the many things I love about the Cathedral – there is always something new to discover!

Finally, this week's poem is by John Farrell, an Australian poet whose work is new to me. This weekend, our Psalm is one of my favourites, Psalm 19, and (spoilers) reflecting on this psalm in the context of the week to come took me down a whole internet discovery about Indigenous astronomy. Farrell, who was born in Buenos Aires, came to Australia in 1852 as a very

young child. The night sky fascinates me, and Farrell's beautiful poem captures many of the colours, sounds, and sights of the night and dawn.

#### The Australian Sunrise

The Morning Star paled slowly, the Cross hung low to the sea, And down the shadowy reaches the tide came swirling free, The lustrous purple blackness of the soft Australian night, Waned in the gray awakening that heralded the light; Still in the dying darkness, still in the forest dim The pearly dew of the dawning clung to each giant limb, Till the sun came up from ocean, red with the cold sea mist, And smote on the limestone ridges, and the shining tree-tops kissed; Then the fiery Scorpion vanished, the magpie's note was heard, And the wind in the she-oak wavered, and the honeysuckles stirred, The airy golden vapour rose from the river breast, The kingfisher came darting out of his crannied nest, And the bulrushes and reed-beds put off their sallow gray And burnt with cloudy crimson at dawning of the day.

### Assets Register – Altar Crosses

'Pelican in her Piety'

#### William Mark (attributed to) 1929 Bronze and Enamel

#### Scully, Ritchie, Lewis Memorial



There are many crosses and brasses in the cathedral which over the decades have been carefully and lovingly polished by many parishioners and Margaret Fauchon was in the processes of cleaning this for Christmas.

When walking around the Cathedral concentrate on these altar crosses and appreciate not only the symbolism but also the craftsmanship and artistry involved. Bronwyn Orrock records the following: 'The *Pelican in her Piety* is shown in the traditional manner, piercing her breast to feed its young with her blood. Her chicks are shown at her feet with their mouths open wide. This is symbolic of Christ's sacrifice for the human race when his blood was shed on the cross for humankind.

This is a memorial donated by C Scully and E J Ritchie in memory of their grandparents Edward and Maria Lewis, and of their parents Walter & Esther Scully & David and Susan Ritchie (engraved on side).

The attributed artist/artisan William Mark, trained and worked in the United Kingdom in the most important metalworking shop of the Arts Crafts period; returning home to become a major figure in Ecclesiastical Fine Arts in Australia, making this to be of national and international Artistic significance.

This appears to be a William Mark Cross – the symmetry and brass bosses on the surface, the beauty of the enamel motif and the very neat underside singles this piece out as the work of a highly skilled artisan/jeweller.

Born at Scarsdale (near Ballarat) Victoria, William Mark was apprenticed to John Rowland in Melbourne, a manufacturing jeweller and silversmith, before opening his own studio in 1891 at 101 Swanston St, where he worked until leaving for the United Kingdom (via a stint in South Africa). In 1895 he joined Nelson Dawson's London Craft Workshop. In 1902 he joined Charles Robert Ashbee's *Guild of Handicraft* at Chipping Campden, which specialised in metal working, enamels and jewellery and hand wrought copper, ironwork and furnishings. Ironically in 1907 that guild went into voluntary liquidation due to commercial pressure from Government sponsored Polytechnics which had been set up copying the very model of Ashbee's Guild. Mark and three others formed the Guild of Handicraft partnership, operating the business until 1919.

After World War I, Mark returned home and set up a new studio in his house from where he worked for the rest of his life.

Although he is noted in the UK for his jewellery of the Edwardian and Art Deco era, his most respected work is ecclesiastical commissions of the highest skill that are demonstrated in the eleven beautiful works residing in the Warrior's (St Michael) Chapel at Christ Church.

William Mark has a reputation for work as perfect underneath as it is on the visible surfaces. There are no marks on this work except for the engraving pertaining to the donors.

His original hand drawn plans and a typewritten letter are in the Deanery Records as at 09/09/2009. If this is by William Mark it was the central piece of a set supplied by Mark for the St Christopher Chapel. The items were later used in the St Nicholas Chapel from where the candlesticks were stolen in the early 1970s.' \*
