



This week the cathedral has welcomed the RSL and War Widows, and members of the Newcastle Club, for their respective ANZAC Commemoration Services. Our cathedral holds many treasures for the Newcastle community, not least of which is the St Michael or Warrior Chapel, built in 1921 as a designated War Memorial. The Eucharist will be celebrated in the Cathedral on ANZAC Day at 8.30am (as it is, every Monday-Friday morning). If you've never taken the time to explore the St Michael Chapel, or indeed look at some of our other treasures, ANZAC Day is a wonderful opportunity.

There are some very significant events happening over the next few weeks. There are farewells for Mr Peter Guy, Cathedral Organist and Master of Choristers, and the Aid Concert for Ukraine on Saturday 30th April. More information is in the pewslip about these events: please share widely!

A little bit about what's happening:

PETER GUY FAREWELLS: Please join us on Sunday May 22 for Peter Guy's final Sunday in the cathedral. There will be refreshments after Evensong. There will also be a farewell function on **Tuesday 31 May 2022 at 6 pm, in the cathedral.** Tickets are only \$35 each, and there is information in the pewslip about how to book your tickets for this night. UKRAINE AID CONCERT: On Saturday 30th April at 2.00pm, the cathedral is hosting an Aid Concert for Ukraine. Finally, this week's poem, is by Elizabeth Rooney. I included one of her poems in my pastoral for Palm Sunday. Evensong on Sunday 22 May 2022 at 6 pm



LOUD SKY COMMUNITY ART PROJECT 2022



During 2022, a series of art workshops will be offered to link the experience and stories of survivors of institutional child sexual abuse, their families and friends, with the creative possibilities of the arts in the lead up to the loud sky exhibition at The Lock-Up in 2023.

Assets Register 24 April 2022 – Eve of ANZAC DAY

World War II, Korean and Vietnam War Memorial Series of 5 works by Reinis Zusters (born 1918 in Ukraine) - the St Nicholas Chapel



There are five separate paintings which depict figurative semi abstact scenes of warfare, its impact on the human condition and the saving grace of Christ, promising eternal life.

The large Panel 3 below is of Jesus Blessing the Dead Soldier and each panel is unified by a



large black cross in the rear ground, at first glance depicting roads or military equipment, ultimately symbolising Christ's death and suffering.

The far left and right depict death masks of a man and woman who have lost their lives in War.

Panel 1 – a soldier is assisted from the battlefield by a mate, in the background are tank and machinery fragments.

Panel 2 – The original bell tower of Christ Church Cathedral, Newcastle Harbour and former BHP Steelworks site form a backdrop for representation of

backdrop for representation

servicemen from the Hunter Valley. Ironically much of the imagery in this panel is no longer part of the landscape of the Hunter.




Panel 4 – The Hunter region represents the 'at home' support of the servicemen by the community.

Panel 5 – a symbolic mother/wife grieve for a lost son/husband.

This is an official War Memorial on the Register of War Memorials of NSW. The Visual Arts Board assisted with installation costs. The memorial was the gift of the Returned Services' League.

The artist, Reinis Zuster, is one of the more important post war painters of his generation and is widely represented in important collections giving this work artistic significance.



Reinis Zusters OAM was born in 1918 in Odessa Ukraine of Latvian Parents. Zusters's father died before he was two years old and he and his sister were raised in an orphanage. He studied at the Riga Art & Technical College, Latvia, from 1935 to 1940 and anatomy at Rig University. Deeply influenced by his Latvian heritage, he admired artist Voldemars Tone (1892-1958).

With his wife and daughter, he emigrated to Australia as a refugee after WWII, moving initially to Perth and then Canberra. A move to Sydney followed with his second wife to

take up a position as chief designer with Australian-American architectural firm Austin-Anderson at St Leonards. Zusters undertook further art studies at East Sydney Technical College, where he was exposed to the abstract period of post war Australian and international art. Zusters was a prolific artist over forty years and won many major awards including The Wynne Prize for Landscape (1959) and others. He was represented at no less than three Osaka Triennials and was recipient of the Bronze Prize in the 1990 Osaka Triennial, Japan, achieving his win over 29 000 artists from 81 countries. At the 1993 Osaka Triennial, which included 10 000 entrants from 91 countries, he was awarded a special prize. Zusters' work is deemed highly collectable and is held in many corporate, government and private collections across Australia.

To celebrate the opening of Sydney Opera House in 1973 Zusters was commissioned to design a plate for the occasion. Twenty were cast in 18ct gold and 980 in sterling silver.

He was a professional artist from 1968 and was awarded the Order of Australia Medal in 1994. He married three times and had two daughters. He died on 8 October 1999 and his ashes are buried in the Latvian section, Rookwood Cemetery Sydney.

A competition, The Newcastle Cathedral Memorial Design Competition, preceded the commission being granted to Zusters. A public exhibition of the finalists' maquettes was displayed at the Von Bertouch Galleries, Cooks Hill. Judges included Dean Beal, Bishop AC Holland, Anne Von Bertouch, Professor L Short and Dr William Bowmore.

This memorial was dedicated by Alfred, Tenth Bishop of Newcastle on 11 November 1982.

In memory of all those who served from Newcastle and the Hunter Valley, in World War II, Korea, Malaya and Vietnam and to those who supported them. "Lest we Forget" *
