Dear Parish Family

Thank you for the messages of affirmation and support following my pastoral last week, and my sermon on Sunday. If you missed the sermon, you can watch it here: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=edKmyGecDzM&t=9s>

Bishop Peter wrote an excellent opinion piece which was published in Wednesday's Newcastle Herald (<https://www.newcastleherald.com.au/story/7872106/gracious-discussion-the-best-and-fairest-way-for-anglicans/>) I encourage you to read the full article. In it, Bishop Peter wrote:

My understanding is that many of the people who see themselves as Anglican want the LGBTIQ+ people they know given a fair go. They don't want to see their gay and lesbian friends discriminated against and would like them to have happy lives. They struggle to reconcile the image of a loving God with a church that seems to want to reject the people they love. This insight is informed by the rudimentary understandings of the Christian faith they have learnt and hold on to.

Please continue to pray for and with our LGBTIQ+ community in this very hurtful and painful time. If you would like to discuss this with me further, I welcome the opportunity to do so. Please contact the office for an appointment. I am attending the Diocesan Leaders Conference this week at Nulkaba, and will be back on Friday.

MASKS: We're more aware of COVID in our communities, as well as the flu, and countless colds and coughs and viruses that are doing the rounds, and making up for two years of strong precautions. Please strongly consider wearing a mask in places, including church, where you feel you are not able to adequately maintain physical distancing.

ATTENDING WORSHIP: Please continue to be mindful of COVIDSafe practices as we gather, and to be mindful of our own health and vulnerabilities as well as those in our community.

The sacrament is administered in both kinds. You are welcome to receive in one or both kinds. We ask that you do not intinct (dip) the host.

Finally, this week's poem is by Dylan Thomas. Probably Dylan Thomas' most well known poem is "Do not go gentle into that good night", in which he reflects on his father dying. This poem, "This bread I break", carries the resonances of the sacrament, framed in confronting language. We can often domesticate, tame the sacraments, and forget that they are radical, even dangerous signs of God's inbreaking into our lives, "outward and visible signs of a God who will not be locked down or denied admission." (Maundy Thursday sermon Christ Church Cathedral, 2021). As we break bread together, are we prepared for the consequences of God's action in us?

This Bread I Break

This bread I break was once the oat,
This wine upon a foreign tree
Plunged in its fruit;
Man in the day or wine at night
Laid the crops low, broke the grape's joy.

Once in this time wine the summer blood
Knocked in the flesh that decked the vine,
Once in this bread

My wine you drink, my bread you snap.

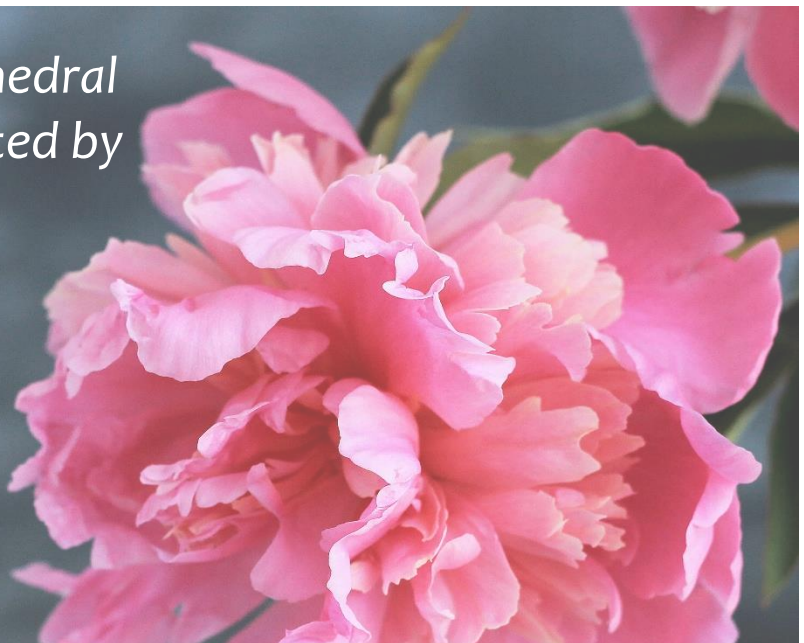

About the music...

Tradition is a tricky thing. While some of our church traditions are based on biblical instruction, many are not. While the Eucharist and the reciting of the Lord's Prayer have their foundation in scripture, other important matters, such as where we put the tea trolley for refreshments after church, and who says the 'thank you' to the guest speaker after the annual card luncheon, are traditions that won't matter very much when we reach the pearly gates. If we wish to stand on tradition we had better be sure that we know where that tradition comes from!

It may come as a surprise how fluid is the tradition of our liturgy - an aspect of church life that is certainly very serious - and today's Communion Setting by Stanford is a case in point. We take it for granted that our morning service will include the Gloria (Glory to God), the Creed, the Sanctus (Holy, holy), the Benedictus (Blessed is He) and the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), adding the Kyrie (Lord, have mercy) and omitting the Gloria during Advent and Lent. However, this 'tradition' is neither timeless nor universal. In 1909 Stanford published a Communion Service in the key of C major - known in the terrible jargon of choral people as 'Stanford in C'. In keeping with the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, Stanford's setting included just the Creed, the Sanctus and the Gloria plus some other sections that we no longer use, but omitted the Benedictus and Agnus Dei. Then, as liturgical expectations changed, the Benedictus and the Agnus Dei were, in some places, included in Anglican worship (they had always been part of Catholic worship), and Stanford subsequently composed a setting of these texts in the key of F major.

These settings were designed to be added, if desired, to the Communion Service in C, as well as to several other settings - an emergency book at the back of the choir cupboard to be used when and where necessary. Hence, this morning, our setting is 'Stanford in C and F'. It is notable that none of the Communion Services in our own prayer book include the Agnus Dei, and the Benedictus is either included in small print and brackets, or left out completely.

Speaking of tradition, our music for Evening Prayer is nourished by the beautiful tradition of plainsong, which was the musical diet of the church for more than a thousand years, and has never ceased to be a source of inspiration for composers. Our wonderful anthem 'In pace' (In peace and into the same I shall sleep and rest), composed in 1572 by a little-known English musician, John Blitheman, intersperses plainsong with techniques that were typical of his time. Our Canticles bring us to the present day - the composer Philip Moore is alive and well, retired from a number of distinguished roles as organist, director and composer at York Minster, Canterbury Cathedral and Guildford Cathedral. In this setting of the canticles the melodies are entirely his own, but reminiscent of plainsong and supported by an exquisite organ accompaniment.

Chamber Music at the Cathedral

Spring into Chamber Music at the Cathedral with an optimistic program of chamber music for flute, strings and piano. An energetic pastoral theme ties together a series of works from the Baroque to the 21st century. Starting with a bouncy Italian baroque trio by Giordani, we move to a set of neo-classical miniature dances by Shostakovich. At the centrepiece of the program are four Slavonic Dances by Dvorak: a Sousedská, a Furiant, a Starodávný and a Kolo, in their original sonorous format of piano 4-hands. A virtuosic trio by Edgar Girtain continues the dance theme in quintessential American style. The concert ends with Haydn's "Gypsy" Piano Trio, so-named because its beautiful early movements are followed by a mad-cap finale incorporating a series of rustic Hungarian dances. A highlight of the concert is our cellist's own composition, "Wind in the Pines".

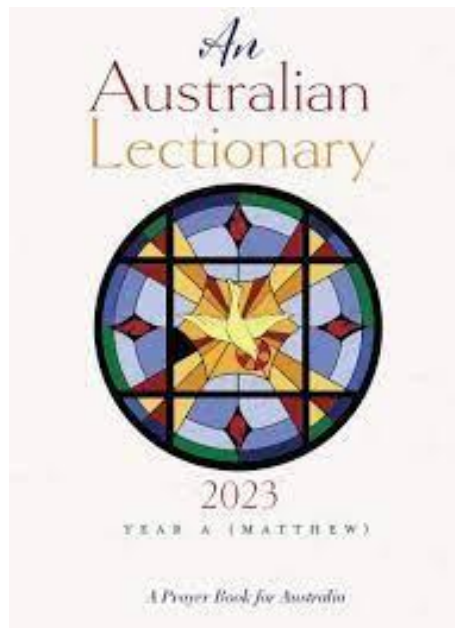

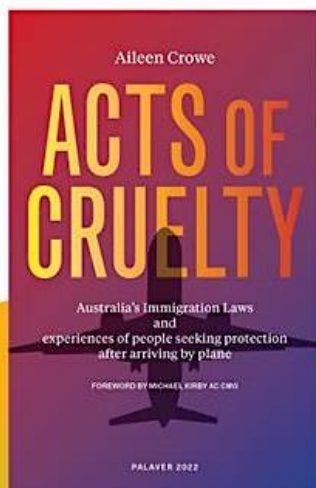


Do you have a spare couple of \$\$ this week?

Join us for the live launch of ***'Acts Of Cruelty: Australia's Immigration Laws and experiences of people seeking protection after arriving by plane'*** by Aileen Crowe.

The book will be launched by Professor Ian Kerridge Professor of Bioethics and Medicine at Sydney Health Ethics, School of Public Health, University of Sydney and member of the Palaver books advisory group, followed by author Aileen Crowe in-conversation with Prof Kerridge and physician and ethicist Prof Paul Komesaroff. Copies of the book will be available for sale and signed by the author.

Acts of Cruelty documents in detail the lived experiences of numerous people and families seeking refuge in Australia as they attempt to navigate the legislative, legal and bureaucratic frameworks and processes that, over two decades, have created an inhumane system confronting those who seek our protection after arriving by plane. Acts of Cruelty also makes important recommendations for improving the system, and cautions that its deliberate cruelty is at risk of poisoning our society.

“This book is of profound importance. As a nation we must face the deep root of inhuman cruelty in our national psyche that our politicians so willingly exploit to advance their own power. A political sea change towards humanity in our immigration settings will only occur if there is strong political pressure from the people for change.”
