Finally, in the spirit of celebration this weekend, I have indulged myself and given two poems for this week. The first is by Australian poet Noel Rowe, part of his *Magnificat* sequence. Appropriately for the first of Christ the King, the voice is that of Mary, reflecting on Simeon's words to her at the Presentation of Christ in the temple. Rowe skilfully charts the course of Christ's life – and resurrection – through reversals, or contradictions. The second poem, by Jewish poet Jacqueline Osherow, talks of reversals as well, - a sort of reverse Big Bang – as the universe sings praise and worships. As we celebrate this weekend, may we never lose sight of the one whom we worship and adore, and for whom we offer celebration.

5. Resurrection

Yes, Simeon, there was sorrow, but much fun too, when he set about making contradiction.

I should have known: for when the glorias first were sung, it was to celebrate my son, born among the dung.

Ever since, I've been hearing heaven's laughter. Cana's newly-weds, absorbed in what was coming after,

did not even notice how the water changed its mind. The Pharisees got a holy shock as a man born blind

told them if they didn't get a hold on their desires, so taken up with Christ, they'd land themselves among his followers.

Sacred irreverence. It is a gift to those found free in the spirit. Even Zaccheus found it in himself, up a tree,

and Lazarus, sauntering around in his shroud. There was a time too when, expecting stones, a crowd

got instead some bread and fish. I heard a thief steal his way back to paradise. The structure of the real

is mercy. Having seen so many reversals, I should have known he would test his muscles

on the stone, and walk away from the dazed grave, leaving its mouth open and amazed.

About the music...

This weekend is exciting indeed! The celebration of Christ the King is celebration enough, but it is also our Cathedral's name day, and the last Sunday of the church's year, with next week - the first week of Advent - the beginning of a new year. So, this weekend is birthday party and New Year's Eve rolled into one. And, in the morning service, we welcome the St Nicholas Choir.

Our music celebrates the great tradition of music here at the Cathedral - at 10am, a new Mass setting, composed specifically for the Cathedral Choir, the St Nicholas Choir and the congregation to sing together, an anthem composed by our amazing organist, David Drury (Ave verum) and Acclamations and Responses composed by our previous Director of Music, Peter Guy follow on from an Introit that precedes the Church of England by several centuries - the 13th-century motet Alle Psallite ('Let us make resounding songs to the Lord). And our evening service connects us to the great English tradition. Herbert Howells' is possibly the best-loved of all 20th-century English church composers, and his Magnificat is paired with another work of David Drury - his delightful Nunc dimittis. Our Preces and Reponses are by Michael Leighton Jones, a New Zealand-born Aussie and a past member of the Choir of Kings College Cambridge, not to mention the vocal teacher of our current Director of Music, David Banney. And we ring out the old year with Henry Purcell's magnificent anthem 'Rejoice in the Lord'. As always, be listening for David Drury's inspiring improvisations and hymn playing.

Pray for clergy who help, pray for volunteers, and give thanks for our safety when others are grieving or fearful.

Proposal to Withdraw St Aidan's Land Sale Trust

At the Parish Council meeting on 1 September, it was moved that permission be sought to withdraw the St Aidan's Land Sale Trust (\$121 307.73 as at 31/07/2022 valuation), for the purpose of payment of expenses associated with property which formed part of the Parish of Hamilton.

Explanation:

St Aidan's Land Sale Trust is one of the Trusts associated with the Parish of Hamilton. The expenditure of this Trust is to meet the costs of essential maintenance on Parish of Hamilton property since the Parish of Hamilton came under the care of the Cathedral parish in 2020.

The Cathedral parish has been paying the expenses associated with the maintenance and upkeep of the buildings of Hamilton parish.

Cost to repairs to the Hall to August 2022 was \$82,766. There are some further costs relating to the ceiling of the area being used by Common Circus as a "storeroom", fly screens to the first-floor windows, and \$4,100 for repairs to leaking pipe between the Church and hall.

Repairs to St Peter's roof and over vestry - \$9,889 ex GST. A significant amount of work was undertaken to make the property at Percy St suitable for leasing. \$6,135 was spent in Jun 2020. Remaining funds will be spent to maintain Hamilton Parish properties, including electrical work at St Peter's. This is Hamilton money, being expended on Hamilton property assets.

An exhibition at Toronto Library, by Create and Connect art group and Nikinpa, with a focus on culturally appropriate sorry business.

The beautiful painted leaves are messages, colours and stories that connect back to country and help people in the grieving process. Each artist has developed a different style in painting leaves and has chosen the colours and patterns that connect with their own artist expression and story.

The leaves are created by the Create and Connect art group which is partnership program between Nikinpa Aboriginal Child and Family Centre and Relationships Australia. Painting the leaves is a partnership between the art group and Forensic medicine team which is part of NSW Health Pathology.

Now when an Aboriginal person passes, a gum leaf is selected for the family to take home and to go with the person who has passed away. These beautiful leaves as well as other art works the Nikinpa art group have created will be displayed as part of the taking them home exhibition.
