Finally, this week's poem is by Anamika, a contemporary Indian poet who writes in Hindi. Our Gospel reading this weekend is about salt and light, and Anamika's poem talks about the ways we encounter salt, and the saltiness of our lives. The image of women's tears:

Women are the salt of the earth,

they have all the salt in the mould of their face.

Ask those women

how heavy it feels—

their saline faces?

is a profound image on this Feast of the Presentation, as we remember Simeon's words to Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel and to be a sign that will be opposed <sup>35</sup> so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul, too." (Luke 2. 33b-35). And, as we look toward Lent, and the women at the foot of the cross on Good Friday, we are reminded of the cost of grief. (Do not forget either, Jesus weeping for Lazarus.)

#### Salt

Salt is earth's sorrow and its taste. Earth's three-fourths is brackish water, and men's heart a salt mountain. Weak is salt's heart, very quickly it melts, it sinks in shame when plates are flung due to salt's varied strength. There stands a government building like a salt shaker shakes with much sophistication, sprinkles salt in my wound. Women are the salt of the earth, they have all the salt in the mould of their face. Ask those women how heavy it feels their saline faces? All those determined to pay the salt's price, all those who couldn't betray their masters have annoyed the seven seas and the revolutionaries. Gandhi knew the salt's worth as the girl-guava-sellers. Whether or not something stays in the world, there shall always be salt. God's tears and man's sweat this is salt that balances the earth. translated from Hindi by Sudeep Sen

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### **Music notes**

It is wonderful to be back to rich musical offerings at the Cathedral after the summer holidays, and 2023 has many wonderful things in store. Besides our music for the liturgy each week, we are very pleased to announce a series of midday concerts on Sundays during Lent, with many other concerts in store as the year goes on.

In this week's music we celebrate Jesus as the 'light of the world'. This theme is especially string in the hymns, and in John Rutter's beautiful 'Gaelic Blessing', the musical climax coincides with the text 'Deep peace of Christ, the light of the world, to you'. A wonderful liturgical moment happened some years ago at my brother's wedding. This anthem was sung as the bride and groom each lit a candle, and then, with their own candles, lit a single, larger candle, symbolising two becoming one. As they lit the larger candle the congregation couldn't see it until the job was done and they stepped back, revealing the new light, and, perhaps divinely inspired, but definitely not choreographed, the choir reached these words – 'Christ the light of the world' – at the same time.

As I have mentioned in the past, an amazing part of our music is the improvisation of our organists, and as you listen to David Drury play during various parts of the service – before and after the service, after the gospel and during the censing of the altar, for example – be aware that David is inventing the music, responding with extraordinary creativity and sensitivity to the liturgical moment and to the texts and themes of the day. Another part of his work is the accompanying of our Psalms. While the harmony is written by the composer, listen for David's choice of registrations – the variety of sounds that the organ can produce – as he colours the text of the Psalm.

Over the next few months, the music notes will include some thoughts about why we have the music that we have in our liturgies. To begin, it is worth asking why we have music at all. In churches around the world, music is at once one of the most important as well as one of the most controversial aspects of Christian worship. At its worst, music can be the trigger for dividing churches and ending clergy careers. Music is such a powerful thing that it can make or break liturgy, but it can also become an end in itself, distracting us from the fact that the purpose of church music is not entertainment – rather, it is one ingredient, along with words, images, architecture, silence, fellowship, prayer and sacrament that bring us closer to God during worship.

We make music because it is one of the things that makes us human. Current thinking in anthropology suggests that singing preceded spoken language in human evolution, and if that is true, then music-making is at the core of our experience. And liturgical music has a divine mandate – if the Psalms are not evidence enough, then a little detail in the account of the Last Supper tells us that Jesus and his disciples 'sang a hymn'. (Oh, to be able to hear that music!) So, as you worship at the Cathedral, may our music be uplifting and inspiring for all of us, continuing a tradition that extends through the ages to the Last Supper and beyond.

### **Pancake Day**

Pancake Day or Shrove Tuesday is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent – the 40 days up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday and was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients


Shrove Tuesday falls on the 21<sup>st</sup> February this year.

A pancake is a thin flat cake, made of batter and fried in a frying pan. A traditional pancake is very thin and is served immediately. Golden Syrup or lemon juice and caster sugar are the usual toppings for pancakes.

The pancake has a very long history and featured in cookery books as far back as 1439. The tradition of tossing or "flipping" them is almost as old.

"And every man and maide doe take their turne, And toss their Pancakes up for feare they burne" (Pasquil's Palin, 1619)
