Music notes

The year seems to be disappearing far too rapidly, and this Sunday will be the last Sunday before we celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration, and then immediately we enter Lent. Today we focus, as we have done for several weeks, on our response to the message of Christmas. Our Mass setting – Viadana's Missa l'Hora Passa (Mass of the passing hour) – is new to the cathedral, and a popular work by a composer whose career and style spanned the transition from the Renaissance to the Baroque – from the sound world of Palestrina to that of Bach – though this Mass is firmly in the Renaissance style.

Today we continue our exploration of church music with a significant question - why have a choir? At the heart of any cathedral's music program are its choirs. As important as the organ and other instruments may be, it is the choir that carries the texts of the liturgy. Over many centuries the world's greatest composers have written music for church choirs, and there is a simple reason for this. Europe was not 'Europe' until the Renaissance – prior to that it was best described as Christendom, and the early evolution of what we now know as European music happened within the church. By the time Christendom gave way to Europe, there was such demand for great music for the church that many composers continued to write liturgical choral music – Palestrina and Tallis through Bach and Handel to Mozart, Haydn and beyond. By the twentieth century liturgical music had become the domain of church music specialists – Stanford and Howells for example, but the quality of this music remained high.

This presents a quandary. Naturally, we want everything in worship to be of the highest possible quality, but this music is so beautiful that it can attract people – singers and congregants – for its own beauty, rather than for its real purpose, which is to enhance our worship. To understand the role of the choir, it is helpful to trace the meaning of the word itself. In Greek drama the 'chorus' was a group of individuals who spoke, sang and danced, offering commentary on the drama rather than being part of it. The dancing was important – the word chorus is related to a circular dance that was part of the action – though I am not suggesting that our choir needs to take up liturgical dancing! (No-one wants to see me dance, for a start!)

In a sense the chorus was the voice of the populus – the people, and this is a very helpful way to think of the choir still today. It has two roles. First, it leads congregational singing of hymns, prayers and responses. Second, it sings various parts of the liturgy on its own. Why do we need a choir to do this? Isn't this elitism and doesn't it risk becoming entertainment? If the attitude of the musicians and the congregation is wrong, then yes, and yes. But these highly-skilled musicians have the ability to sing a wide variety of beautiful music, based on different texts in the liturgy, different readings in the lectionary, and different seasons of the church year. As they sing, the congregation has the chance to be immersed in texts and actions in ways that can't happen without music. There is nothing wrong with us loving the music for its own sake, but the choir's real role is to enhance the meaning of texts and add to the drama of worship. The 'chorus' has never lost its role as the voice of the people – in church it is the voice of the congregation. This is one reason why the choir does not face the congregation – the choir represents the people, not God, even if Directors of Music would sometimes like to think otherwise!

So, as you listen to the choir today and in weeks to come, contemplate the words that are sung – this is a chance for you to reach deeper into their meaning, inspired by the beauty of the music.



Pancake Day

Pancake Day or Shrove Tuesday is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent

– the 40 days up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon

Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call

people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday and was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients

Shrove Tuesday falls on the 21st February this year.

A pancake is a thin flat cake, made of batter and fried in a frying pan. A traditional pancake is very thin and is served immediately. Golden Syrup or lemon juice and caster sugar are the usual toppings for pancakes.

The pancake has a very long history and featured in cookery books as far back as 1439. The tradition of tossing or "flipping" them is almost as old. "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And toss their Pancakes up for feare they burne" (Pasquil's Palin, 1619)
