Dear Parish Family



Finally, this week's poem is a lengthy poem (in contrast to last week's very short poem), by one of my favourite poets, Edwin Muir. Traditionally, on the Sunday before Lent, we hear the Gospel of the Transfiguration. Muir's poem, told from the point of view of Peter and James and John, sees a world transfigured, not only Christ. In the second section, we realise that this is a post-resurrection reflection, casting forward to the coming of Christ once more. It is, as I said, a longer poem than I would normally choose. However, as we enter Lent this week, it gives us space to pause and reflect and wonder too.

The Transfiguration

So from the ground we felt that virtue branch
Through all our veins till we were whole, our wrists
As fresh and pure as water from a well,
Our hands made new to handle holy things,
The source of all our seeing rinsed and cleansed
Till earth and light and water entering there
Gave back to us the clear unfallen world.

We would have thrown our clothes away for lightness, But that even they, though sour and travel stained, Seemed, like our flesh, made of immortal substance, And the soiled flax and wool lay light upon us Like friendly wonders, flower and flock entwined As in a morning field. Was it a vision? Or did we see that day the unseeable One glory of the everlasting world Perpetually at work, though never seen Since Eden locked the gate that's everywhere And nowhere? Was the change in us alone, And the enormous earth still left forlorn, An exile or a prisoner? Yet the world We saw that day made this unreal, for all Was in its place. The painted animals Assembled there in gentle congregations, Or sought apart their leafy oratories, Or walked in peace, the wild and tame together, As if, also for them, the day had come. The shepherds' hovels shone, for underneath The soot we saw the stone clean at the heart As on the starting-day. The refuse heaps Were grained with that fine dust that made the world; For he had said, 'To the pure all things are pure.' And when we went into the town, he with us, The lurkers under doorways, murderers, With rags tied round their feet for silence, came Out of themselves to us and were with us, And those who hide within the labyrinth Of their own loneliness and greatness came, And those entangled in their own devices, The silent and the garrulous liars, all Stepped out of their dungeons and were free. Reality or vision, this we have seen. If it had lasted but another moment It might have held for ever! But the world Rolled back into its place, and we are here, And all that radiant kingdom lies forlorn, As if it had never stirred; no human voice Is heard among its meadows, but it speaks To itself alone, alone it flowers and shines And blossoms for itself while time runs on.

But he will come again, it's said, though not Unwanted and unsummoned; for all things, Beasts of the field, and woods, and rocks, and seas, And all mankind from end to end of the earth Will call him with one voice. In our own time, Some say, or at a time when time is ripe. Then he will come, Christ the uncrucified, Christ the discrucified, his death undone, His agony unmade, his cross dismantled— Glad to be so—and the tormented wood Will cure its hurt and grow into a tree In a green springing corner of young Eden, And Judas damned take his long journey backward From darkness into light and be a child Beside his mother's knee, and the betrayal Be quite undone and never more be done.

Music notes

The Feast of the Transfiguration commemorates one of the most extraordinary events in the New Testament. As Jesus appeared to his disciples 'dazzling white', 'whiter than white', accompanied by two towering Old Testament figures, our music takes up themes of light, and our hymns draw links between the Old and New Testaments. Bach's glorious motet 'O Jesu Christ, meins Lebens Licht' (O Jesus, light of my life) is a slow motion vision of light, with musical lines slowly unfolding and revealing ever more brilliance. There is a connection between morning and evening: the composer of the morning Psalm chant is the composer of the Evening canticles - T. Tertius Noble - one of the great organists and composers of the first half of the twentieth century, with a career that took him from Ely Cathedral and York Minster to St Thomas Church in New York. His Canticles (Magnificat and Nunc dimittis) are among the most popular in the repertoire, and chosen today partly because of his setting of the line 'to be a light to lighten the Gentiles'. Noble employs a swell - in each phrase the music swells louder and then recedes, and this has always reminded me of the light from a lighthouse, emerging from dark to light and back again as it revolves. Our Evensong anthem is the most popular choral work of the Hungarian composer Zoltan Kodaly - a setting of a folk song that calls for God to watch over us during the darkness of the night:

May God grant me a good night, May He send me His holy angel: May He encourage the dreams in our hearts; May God grant us a good night!

Hymns

Continuing our series about church music in general, this week we ask the question why sing hymns? Hymns are the poetry of the church, and have a history that reaches back into pre-Christian times. The word 'hymn' was used for religious songs of praise or lament in the ancient Greek world, and we are told that a hymn was sung at the Last Supper. Over the centuries hymns have been an integral part of Christian life and worship, serving a number of important purposes. Notwithstanding the variable quality of hymns, the best of them are an inspirational part of worship through their sheer beauty. Beyond this, hymns have been a very effective way of encapsulating scripture and teaching doctrine and theology - the rhythm and rhyme of the texts, especially when combined with music, make them much easier to remember than prose. This was and still is especially important in times and places where literacy is poor: hymns, like stained glass windows and Christian art, are a valuable vehicle for teaching and learning.

Alongside all of this, hymns offer the chance for a congregation to sing together - an act of synchrony that is inspiring and educational in itself. Dare I say it, this is also a rare thing - a congregation united, albeit briefly, in one purpose. At least, that is, until someone complains that the hymns aren't to their liking and decides not to participate...


We see the whole gamut of hymn styles and purposes in today's selections. In the morning services the opening hymn reminds us that the gospel emerges from the story of Israel - our Christian history extends to eternity in both directions - a message that is never seen more clearly than in the story of the Transfiguration.


The gospel hymn - 'Christ upon the mountain peak' - captures the Transfiguration story itself, and reminds us in the last verse that we are called to join with all the saints and prophets in adoration. The communion hymn brings thoughts of the Transfiguration to the act of communion - 'Here, gracious Lord, we see you face to face', while the post-communion hymn, actually a versified adaptation of the Magnificat, captures the ecstasy of the Transfiguration and sends us out to live spirit-filled lives.

I have observed an interesting thing over many years. Congregants in various churches multi-task when they get to the end of a hymn - as they reach the last line they can be seen looking at the hymn board to find out what the next hymn will be and thumbing through the hymn book to find it. My preference would be to stay in the moment with the hymn we are singing - ponder the words, even after the hymn is over, and the next hymn will come soon enough.

As we worship today and in the weeks ahead I leave you with John Wesley's instructions for singing hymns: 'Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength.'



Pancake Day

Pancake Day or Shrove Tuesday is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday. Lent

– the 40 days up to Easter – was traditionally a time of fasting and on Shrove Tuesday, Anglo-Saxon

Christians went to confession and were "shriven" (absolved from their sins). A bell would be rung to call

people to confession. This came to be called the "Pancake Bell" and is still rung today.

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday and was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast and pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients

Shrove Tuesday falls on the 21st February this year.

A pancake is a thin flat cake, made of batter and fried in a frying pan. A traditional pancake is very thin and is served immediately. Golden Syrup or lemon juice and caster sugar are the usual toppings for pancakes.

The pancake has a very long history and featured in cookery books as far back as 1439. The tradition of tossing or "flipping" them is almost as old. "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And toss their Pancakes up for feare they burne" (Pasquil's Palin, 1619)

ABM Lent Appeal 2023

The 2023 Lent and Good Friday Appeal supports the work of the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem via the outreach of the Ahli Hospital in Gaza and a new youth empowerment project.

Shorouq is a young mother, who lives in one of the most marginalised parts of Gaza City. Her two-year-old daughter, Hala, was screened and selected to be part of the Ahli's child nutrition program to address her malnutrition.

In Shorouq's words, "My husband is unemployed, and we are living in deplorable conditions. We are unable to meet our fundamental demands. We are completely reliant on [United Nations] food assistance, which is insufficient because we also require medicine and cash to purchase other necessities.

"I heard about the free nutrition program that Ahli Arab Hospital implemented... The Ahli was a compassionate and delightful place for us as they cared for my daughter and provided us with the necessary medications, vitamins, and biscuits that supported her quick recovery."

As well as being good news for little Hala, the Ahli's program was also good news for Shorouq on a more personal level, as she received health and nutrition training both in her home and her community from women community trainers (mobilisers) who have been especially trained by the Ahli.

Shorouq continues: "I acquired more and more knowledge; my health awareness increased through the Ahli's 'woman-to-woman approach'. Their community mobiliser visited me twice a month, correcting my misconceptions and wrong health behaviours, and improving my communication skills, and gender and protection concepts. All of this knowledge and skills positively impacted my life.

"After participating in the individual awareness workshops, I became stronger, I can face the injustice that may occur, and I can protect myself alone. My awareness of my rights and responsibilities was raised; I am capable of solving my problems alone now. I have good communication channels and dialogue with my husband... And I succeeded to change some negative behaviours for myself and my husband such as helping me in the home, since I have a risky pregnancy.

"Many thanks to the Ahli Hospital and to AID, and to all the people who care for vulnerable groups and provide assistance to the needy," Shorouq remarks graciously.

Your support of this appeal will empower many vulnerable women like Shorouq, and will give their children a much greater chance of a healthy life.
