SUPERCAR EVENT: The other important news I want to draw to your attention is around Sunday March 12th. As the Supercar weekend is coming closer, parking conditions around the Cathedral are changing to bus zones and clearways. Please check where you are parking! On Sunday March 12th, there will be **ONE EUCHARIST** in the parish at St Peter's Hamilton (148 Dennison Street, Hamilton.) There will be no services at the Cathedral on that Sunday. Finally, this week's poem is by Lynn Ungar. Ungar is a Unitarian Universalist minister, based in Vancouver, Washington. I was searching for a poem to connect with our gospel reading for this weekend, and found this poem. Ungar cuts right to the chase from her opening lines: being born again, new birth, is a costly, often painful, endeavour. Her poem ends on a note of hope – walking into the light – a very apposite image for a Johannine gospel passage.

Born Again

Let's be clear about this: It isn't the same as being sick and getting better. It isn't changing your mind at the last minute or pushing away from the brink. The only way to be born again is to die. The Phoenix doesn't just go up in a blaze of glory. It feels the fire lick up and sizzle every feather, until each quill becomes a column of flame carried straight to the core. Whatever the legend of re-birth, there is always time in the fire, under the ground, hanging on the cross or the tree. Don't skip over that part of the story. If you would be reborn, you have to die. But what then? After the dying how are we to rise again into new life? The earth, the hero, the god, you and Ihow does any of us find our way back from the Valley of the Shadow? The same way we die: Walk into the light. Lynn Ungar

Music notes

As we come to the second week in Lent we continue our focus on unaccompanied choral music, denying ourselves the rich comforts of the sound of the organ. On Sunday morning our Mass setting is by Novocastrian composer Sam Donovan, a long-time member of the Cathedral choir, and our anthem is a choral classic – 'God so loved the world' from Stainer's oratorio The Crucifixion, while our introit is an indigenous hymn that takes up the same text.

We continue our exploration of church music in general by looking at something that we do every week, the singing of the Mass. The term Mass is not specifically a musical term, but a liturgical term, describing an act of worship that involves a particular sequence of prayers, readings and actions, and including the Eucharist. While there is some debate about this, it is generally thought that the term 'Mass' is derived from the word 'missa', which is part of the last sentence of the Roman liturgy – '*lta, missa est*', which can be translated as 'Go, you are dismissed'. The word *missa* is related to our mission, and if this theory is the correct one, it is fascinating and instructive that the name for what we do on Sunday morning relates to our leaving church, rather than going to church. The Mass prepares us for mission, rather than being an end in itself. Mission is not the sole responsibility of the priest, but of all who attend the Mass, and arguably much more the responsibility of the congregation than of the priest.

Historically the 'Missa' consists of two interwoven components, the Ordinary ('ordinarium') and the Proper ('proprium'). These are very strange words to our modern ears, with meanings that are definitely lost in translation, or more correctly lost in their evolution over the centuries. Surely there is nothing 'ordinary' about what we do, and who really wants to be 'proper'?! We need to look to the original meanings of the words. *Ordinarium* means a sequence, or order of things – something that is done the same way every time. *Proprium* implies something chosen for a specific purpose. In the context of liturgy, the Ordinary of the Mass are the elements that are the same every week, which in our context include the Kyrie (in Lent and Advent), Gloria (except in Lent and Advent), Creed, Sanctus, Benedictus and Agnus Dei. The Proper of the Mass are those elements that change each week – the readings, the intercessions, the Introit and various other prayers.

Lent is a good time to think about the first element of the Ordinary – the Kyrie. The original text is Greek, reflecting its particularly ancient origin and its importance: the Roman church never saw it necessary to translate it into Latin. The text Kyrie eleison means Lord, have mercy, and it is interspersed with Christe eleison – Christ, have mercy. Traditionally the Kyrie eleison is sung three times, the Christe three times, and then the Kyrie a further three times, producing a ninefold pattern based on the nine angels of Revelation. Depending on the composer of each week's setting, we sometimes sing Kyrie eleison, and sometimes Lord, have mercy. As the first part of the Ordinary of the Mass, the Kyrie is part of the rite of penitence. Next week we will explore the Sanctus and Benedictus - the next elements of the Mass as we sing it during Lent.


SHROVE TUESDAY

ABM Lent Appeal 2023

The 2023 Lent and Good Friday Appeal supports the work of the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem via the outreach of the Ahli Hospital in Gaza and a new youth empowerment project.

Shorouq is a young mother, who lives in one of the most marginalised parts of Gaza City. Her two-year-old daughter, Hala, was screened and selected to be part of the Ahli's child nutrition program to address her malnutrition.

In Shorouq's words, "My husband is unemployed, and we are living in deplorable conditions. We are unable to meet our fundamental demands. We are completely reliant on [United Nations] food assistance, which is insufficient because we also require medicine and cash to purchase other necessities.

"I heard about the free nutrition program that Ahli Arab Hospital implemented... The Ahli was a compassionate and delightful place for us as they cared for my daughter and provided us with the necessary medications, vitamins, and biscuits that supported her quick recovery."

As well as being good news for little Hala, the Ahli's program was also good news for Shorouq on a more personal level, as she received health and nutrition training both in her home and her community from women community trainers (mobilisers) who have been especially trained by the Ahli.

Shorouq continues: "I acquired more and more knowledge; my health awareness increased through the Ahli's 'woman-to-woman approach'. Their community mobiliser visited me twice a month, correcting my misconceptions and wrong health behaviours, and improving my communication skills, and gender and protection concepts. All of this knowledge and skills positively impacted my life.

"After participating in the individual awareness workshops, I became stronger, I can face the injustice that may occur, and I can protect myself alone. My awareness of my rights and responsibilities was raised; I am capable of solving my problems alone now. I have good communication channels and dialogue with my husband... And I succeeded to change some negative behaviours for myself and my husband such as helping me in the home, since I have a risky pregnancy.

"Many thanks to the Ahli Hospital and to AID, and to all the people who care for vulnerable groups and provide assistance to the needy," Shorouq remarks graciously.

Your support of this appeal will empower many vulnerable women like Shorouq, and will give their children a much greater chance of a healthy life.
