Dear Parish Family

Actual conversation in the Deanery last night: "How is it Holy Week next week?" It seems time moves ever quickly, and for our family, our Lent has had an extra depth of grief. However, Holy Week it is next week, and service times are in the pewslip. We begin our journey of the week with our Palm celebrations on Sunday (don't forget: Daylight Saving ENDS, so you have an extra hour sleep in!), and on into our observance of the Great Three Days or Triduum.

The Great Three Days or Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter) is understood to be one act of worship. There is no dismissal from Thursday evening until Easter. If you are able to attend on all three days, it enriches our experience of this sacred time.

I remain thankful that as a Parish Community we are committed to the ongoing work of being a safe, welcoming, inclusive, and affirming place for all. Thank you also for your ongoing prayers for our LGBTQIA+ community, at this time when their validity and identity continues to be challenged and questioned.

WHAT'S HAPPENING...

CLEANING BEE: Our traditional cleaning bee at the Cathedral is on Easter Eve, Saturday 8th April from 9.00am. BYO everything – gloves, dusters, cleaners, and enthusiasm!

TENEBRAE: is a beautiful service of scripture and music and reflection. In this service, we move from light to darkness, foreshadowing the movement at Easter from darkness to light. It is Sunday evening at 6.00pm.

Finally, this week's poem is by Malcolm Guite, priest and poet. It's a long time since I've chosen one of Guite's poems, and this one blends the ash of the start of Lent with our journey this weekend. Two weeks ago, Canon Andrew Eaton preached powerfully at our Lenten Evensong about our call to care for the environment as one of the marks of our mission. Guite blends Scripture with our lived reality, and calls on us to change for new life.

Ash Wednesday

Receive this cross of ash upon your brow,
Brought from the burning of Palm Sunday's cross.
The forests of the world are burning now
And you make late repentance for the loss.
But all the trees of God would clap their hands
The very stones themselves would shout and sing
If you could covenant to love these lands
And recognise in Christ their Lord and king.

He sees the slow destruction of those trees, He weeps to see the ancient places burn, And still you make what purchases you please, And still to dust and ashes you return. But Hope could rise from ashes even now Beginning with this sign upon your brow.

About the music...

There is no period of time in the church's year with a richer musical offering than this week, as we journey from Palm Sunday to Easter. Weather permitting, the week begins in grand style, with trumpet fanfares and a joyous choral introit in the cathedral grounds, recalling Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on the first 'Palm Sunday'. Our service then takes a serious turn, as we hear the Passion narrative, interspersed with verses of a beautiful hymn - 'My song is love unknown'.

On Sunday evening, our usual Evensong makes way for the service of Tenebrae. Tenebrae means darkness, and in this very special service we trace the story of the crucifixion in words, prayers and music. An important part of the service is an extensive text known as the Tenebrae responsories, which the choir will sing in a very moving and dramatic setting by Peter Guy. The music will include a wonderful Iceland hymn - Heyr, himna smiður - based on a 13th century text, imploring help from the 'Smith of Heaven'.

Next comes Maundy Thursday, which begins the 'Tridium' ('three days') from the Last Supper, through Jesus' arrest, trial and death, to his resurrection on Easter Day. A great deal happens at the Maundy Thursday service, and music is part of every aspect. Our introit is a setting of 'A new commandment', the text from which Maundy Thursday gets his name. (Maundy is related to mandatum = commandment.) As we re-enact Jesus washing the disciples' feet, the time-honoured text is 'Ubi caritas' - 'Where love is, there is God'. The text, as relevant today as when it was first written, comes from the 8th century:


Where charity and love are, God is there. Love of Christ has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice in Him and be glad. Let us fear, and let us love the living God.

If we put ourselves in the place of the disciples, the first 'Maundy Thursday' began with no hint of what was to come. Similarly, our liturgy begins with joy, and our Kyrie and Gloria use big forces - choir, organ and strings. But then things take a turn as we prepare for the horrors of the night. Accordingly, following a European tradition we close the doors of the organ and the remainder of the music will be either unaccompanied or with string accompaniment. The remainder of the Mass is Plainsong and the anthem is unaccompanied (Heyr, himna smiður).

The service finishes with the stripping of the altar and the removal of the sanctuary furnishings, while the choir sings Psalm 51. Tonight's setting of Psalm 51 is one of the most famous choral works of all time - Allegri's 'Miserere' (the title coming from the first line of Psalm 51). The choir is divided into three groups - the main choir, a men's choir and a quartet of soloists who will sing from the organ loft. The music alternates between the three groups, until all of the singers are heard together in the final verse. Psalm 51, composed by David in remorse for his plotting of the death of Bathsheba's husband, is incredibly important in the Easter story. Beginning as a confession of our brokenness, and an acknowledgment of our need for God's forgiveness, the text includes the realisation that the sacrifice of animals is not enough for God:

You do not delight in sacrifice, or I would bring it; you do not take pleasure in burnt offerings. My sacrifice, O God, is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart you, God, will not despise.

To us, enlightened believers of the New Testament world, this statement seems perfectly ordinary. But at a time when ritual sacrifice was the norm all across the region, this statement is radical. The Old Testament can often seem brutal and far removed from our New Testament sensibilities (even if our behavior as a human race hasn't improved). But here we read one of the first examples of the extraordinary point of the Old Testament - a dawning awareness of a God of love, who demands personal responsibility, self-denial and loving sacrifice rather than formulaic religiosity. And it is in the light of this understanding that Jesus' death must be seen - a sacrifice to end all sacrifices.




Suite for solo cello in d minor, BWV1008 (BACH) Suite in F a la Bach for solo cello (BANNEY)






