Then I'll make here my place, (The road leads on), Stand still and set my face, (The road leaps on), Stay here, for ever stay. None stays here, none. I cannot find the way. The way leads on. Oh places I have passed! That journey's done. And what will come at last? The road leads on.

About the music...

Worship at Christ Church Cathedral is part of a living tradition, and an important aspect of this over many years has been the creation of new art, literature, poetry and music. This Sunday our Choral Eucharist begins with an Introit composed on a text by one of our choristers, Wendy James. It is a great privilege to have a writer of Wendy's calibre in our midst - one of Australia's leading writers, Wendy has been published by Penguin and Harper Collins, and a past winner of the Ned Kelly Award for the best first crime novel. Wendy's text is based on today's gospel, and blends English and Latin - a so-called *macaronic* text:

Do not be troubled:

There are many rooms in our Father's house;

He will prepare a place.

O Via, Vita, Veritas

Do not be troubled:

He will take us to Himself;

And we will know the way.

O Via, Vita, Veritas

Our Evensong commemorates the Coronation of King Charles III with music that traces the history of the Anglican tradition. Richard Ayleward (1626-1669) was Director of Music at Norwich Cathedral, and his setting of the Preces and Responses is one of the most popular in the repertoire. Two generations later, Henry Purcell was the greatest English-born composer of his time (eclipsed only by the German-born Handel, whose music, ironically, became synonymous with English pomp and pageantry), turning his back on a successful career as an opera

composer to become the Director of Music at Westminster Abbey, and then at the Chapel Royal. Purcell is buried next to the organ in Westminster Abbey. English music entered a long period of decline after the death of Purcell, revived in the nineteenth century by composers such as Wesley, Stainer and Elgar, and these composers paved the way for a new period of great church music in the twentieth century. Perhaps the greatest of all English church composers in the last 100 years was Herbert Howells, the composer of this evening's second hymn. Howells developed a highly personal musical style, perfectly suited to the needs of Anglican liturgy. Sir Henry Walford Davies, the composer of the chant that we sing for Psalm 121, succeeded none less than Edward Elgar as Master of the Kings Music, a position currently held by Judith Weir. Continuing in this great tradition, the St Nicholas Canticles was composed for Christ Church Cathedral's children's choir - the St Nicholas Choir, to be sung with our Cathedral Choir.

As we turn our thoughts to the UK, it is exciting to announce that the Cathedral Choir will tour England in 2025, with residencies at Salisbury, Chichester and Coventry Cathedral.

Rae Richards – A celebration of her work Making of the Banners

In a publication *Wood, Brick & Stone: The Making of the Hunter,* Rae explains how these magnificent banners came about. The idea grew out of a cathedral performance of *Murder in the Cathedral* where the set design included hangings of highly coloured bunting throughout the Nave. This enrichment of the unrenovated cathedral inspired The Arts and Beautification Committee to approach Rae to do a commission as she had been exhibiting wall hangings. After offering plans and sketches, she was offered the commission and the committee set about fund raising to meet her modest price. She said, "I really wanted to do this and already envisaged how it would be!" She then set about researching signs, symbols and saints of the Christian Church.

Her discussions with Dean Robert Beal "were always experiences to be treasured." Dean Beal was very tall and Rae very small and often when walking up and down the aisle, there was argument about subject matter. It had been decided that the banners would be cheerful with no martys. When Dean Robert suggested Saint Catherine on her flaming wheel, Rae retored, "Hardly cheerful." The Dean replied "But think of the colour." Rae promised him archangels. So agreeement was reached: in general, the battle of good against evil, angels, saints, signs and symbols reverent but always a heavy leaning to the purely decorative.

The banners took a full year of fairly constant work to complete. They are double-sided, the chief image facing the congregation, the reverse a related image or in the case of saints and angels, their arms and attributes – thirty-two sides. This is Rae's own statement:

Although all the images belong and are relevant to Christian belief, the subject is secondary to the decorative intent. As is proper for banners, the charges are heraldically correct though sometimes freely interpreted.

The banners were hung in 1976/77 by the members of The Arts and Beautification Committee, the verger and his ladder and under Rae's direction and the watchful eye of Dean Robert. A Faculty of ninety-nine years was granted by the bishop in a full dress ceremony in that same year.



A couple of years ago, Rae visited the cathedral to meet Dean Katherine Bowyer. Here she is with a banner of the Magi and the painting 'The Three Wise Men' – (The Adoration of the Magi) which is a memorial to her late husband, Dr Peter Richards OAM.

The tapestry of St Nicholas (patron saint of children and many other things), which hangs near the St Nicholas Chapel, is in memory of her son Jeffrey Richards.



In 2014 The University Gallery exhibited 124 of her works (many from collections) entitled

Rae Richards Past Imperfect – Future Conditional.



A memorial service celebrating her life and work will be held in Christ Church Cathedral on Tuesday 16 May, 2023 at 2.00pm.

A box can be found near our sock box in the Narthex of the Cathedral or at St Peter's or we can collect from you and these items will be delivered to Belmont for this valuable service.






Electronic Giving

How to pray with a labyrinth, a walking meditation: Stephen Barany

Praying with a labyrinth is a form of walking meditation, a physical expression of the interior journey towards Christ that characterizes all Christian meditation....forms of walking meditation evoke our earthly journey towards heaven while ... giving us time and space to listen and respond to the Lord.

The earliest examples of labyrinths go back nearly 5,000 years, but the use of labyrinths in Christian prayer emerged during the Middle Ages.

"Meditation is above all a quest. The mind seeks to understand the why and how of the Christian life, in order to hear and respond to what the Lord is asking." -Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2705

How to pray with a labyrinth

Consider reading a passage from Scripture to set your mind on God's accompaniment with you.... There are many possibilities, but here are a few: <u>Deuteronomy 1:31</u>, <u>Exodus 13:21-22</u>, <u>Isaiah 42:1-9</u>, <u>Luke 24:13-35</u>.

You can begin your walking meditation with the following steps.

1. Name your intention

Since we embark on a walking meditation in order to hear and respond to the Lord, **invite God to walk with you** during this prayer period. Ask for the grace to hear and respond to him. If you have any particular intentions on your heart, name them to God at this time and tell him that you will carry these intentions with you during the walk.

2. Walk the path

Enter and follow the path of the labyrinth, knowing that God is with you. Go at a pace that feels natural. As you move along the path, notice what is happening in your mind and heart. There is no agenda to this prayer. Rather, **let your prayer unfold as you go and trust in God's guidance**. If your mind wanders to thoughts that seem like distractions, name the distraction, lift it up to God and ask God to guide your mind and heart back to him. If the distraction returns, explore it with God.

3. Give thanks

When you reach the centre of the labyrinth, thank God for having walked with you along the way.

4. Reflect

Afterwards, take time to reflect on your walking meditation. Write down your thoughts, feelings or anything else that you experienced. If something from these recollections stands out to you, consider exploring it at another time in prayer or in spiritual direction.
