This week we hosted our annual visit from the Year Seven students from the Diocesan Schools for a day at the Cathedral. For most of these students from Scone Grammar, Manning Valley Anglican College, Bishop Tyrrell Anglican College, and Lakes Anglican Grammar, it was their first visit to the Cathedral. I love welcoming people to the Cathedral, and it was wonderful to welcome these students, and hear and see their excitement as they discovered the Cathedral for themselves. We who worship here week by week can forget how awe inspiring both the Cathedral and St Peter's are as buildings, saturated in prayer. A good exercise might be to look at the familiar through the eyes of a visitor!

As a Parish Community we are committed to the ongoing work of being a safe, welcoming, inclusive, and affirming place for all. We are committed to the journey of *Makarrata* – reconciliation with First Nations peoples. Thank you also for your ongoing prayers for our LGBTQIA+ community, at this time when their validity and identity continues to be challenged and questioned.

ATTENDING WORSHIP: I am very aware of rising COVID-19 infection rates as we come into winter. Please continue to be mindful of COVIDSafe practices as we gather, and to be mindful of our own health and vulnerabilities as well as those in our community. Please strongly consider wearing a mask in places, including church, where you feel you are not able to adequately maintain physical distancing.

The sacrament is administered in both kinds. You are welcome to receive in one or both kinds. We ask that you do not intinct (dip) the host.

Finally, this week's poem, is by Mohja Kahf, Syrian-American poet, novelist, and professor. Our first reading this week tells part of the story of Hagar. The story of the

treatment of Hagar does not cover either Abraham or Sarah with glory. (Indeed, as those who were at Evensong last Sunday night will attest, some of Abraham's actions are questionable at the very least.) Mahja Kahf has written a series of poems on Hagar. This poem imagines Hagar writing to Sarah, naming the cruelty, and the loss of joy, for both.

Hagar Writes a Cathartic as an Exercise Suggested by her Therapist

Dear Sarah, life made us enemies But it doesn't have to be that way. What if we both ditched the old man? He could have visitation rights with the boys alternate weekends and holidays. Yeah, especially the Feast of the Sacrifice everybody has forgotten anyway that it began with me abandoned in the desert watching my baby dehydrate for days— I dared God to let us die. Anyway, you and I, we'd set up house, raise the kids, start a catering business, maybe. You have brains. So do I. We could travel. There are places to see besides Ur and this nowheresville desert with its tribes of hooligans No. Your lips always thin when you disapprove, like the mother I can hardly remember from before I wound up in your house. I was barely more than a girl. You are the one Who brought me there from Egypt. You used to laugh back then. In those days, You could bear to look at me. Oh, Sarah, you need years of therapy Can't you admit that what he did to me was cruel? Admit it – for just one second It won't make you hate him forever just long enough to know the world won't fall apart. Long enough to pity him, yourself, me Laugh, Sarah, laugh **Imagine** God, the Possibility. Sincerely Love, Hagar Mohja Kahf 1967-

About the music....

As the war in Ukraine stretches well into its second year, we acknowledge this tragedy with a Mass on Ukrainian Folksongs. All of the melodies in this Mass come from Ukrainian folksongs, moulded to fit the text of the Mass, with harmonies added and accompanied by strings and piano. The chant for the Psalm is based on one of the most popular of all Ukrainian melodies. The Introit is based on a text

from the Beaititudes - Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God (Beati pacifici quoniam filii Dei vocabuntur). For our anthem we complete a month of musical settings of the text *Tantum ergo*, a poem that takes us to the heart of the Eucharist:

Down in adoration falling,
Lo! the sacred Host we hail;
Lo! o'er ancient forms departing,
newer rites of grace prevail;
faith for all defects supplying,
where the feeble senses fail.
To the everlasting Father,
and the Son who reigns on high,
with the Holy Ghost proceeding
forth from Each eternally,
be salvation, honor, blessing,
might and endless majesty. Amen.

More banners – Arch-Angel Raphael





The Chief of the Guardian Angels, guardian of all humanity and in particular, all wayfarers. He is also called the 'Healer of God'. The symbols of his care, a wallet

and a staff, are shown on the reverse. (From the cathedral brochure)



Raphael is one of the seven Archangels who stand before the throne of the Lord, and one of the only three mentioned by name in the Bible. He appears, by name, only in the **Book of Tobit.** Raphael's name means "God heals." This identity came about because of the biblical story that claims he "healed" the earth when it was defiled by the sins of the fallen angels in the apocryphal book of Enoch. Although only the archangels Gabriel and Michael are mentioned by name in the New Testament, the Gospel of John speaks of the pool

at Bethesda, where many ill people rested, awaiting the moving of the water. "An angel of the Lord descended at certain times into the pond; and the water was moved. And he that went down first into the pond after the motion of the water was made whole of whatsoever infirmity he lay under" John 5:1-4. Because of the healing powers often linked to Raphael, the angel spoken of is generally associated with St. Raphael, the Archangel. (Catholic Online)

Note: Iconography. Raphael is said to guard pilgrims on their journeys and is often depicted holding a staff. He is also often depicted holding or standing on a fish, which alludes to his healing of Tobit with the fish's gall. Early mosaics often show him and the other archangels in the clothing of a Byzantine courtier.

Walking from Nazareth to Galilee, then on to Jerusalem and beyond... A Pilgrimage led by Rev'd Michael Armstrong

There is something special and sacred about the Holy Land – stepping in the places where Jesus trod, touching the places he touched.

In 2024 I am planning to take a pilgrimage with a difference – a walk from Nazareth to Galilee, then on to Jerusalem. It is a Pilgrimage with a difference including a trek, before a tour by bus and foot around Jerusalem.

We will visit sacred sites that are part of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We will also visit sites and places linked with other parts of the scriptures. Importantly we will also be visiting the amazing work of the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem, supported through the Sustainable Communities Program of the Anglican Board of Mission Anglicans in Development (ABM AID).


This tour is led by myself through Olive Tree Travel and Keshet Tours. It is with a small group – deliberately as that is part of the experience that is offered. Pilgrims who attend will be expected to raise funds for ABM AID's Sustainable Communities Program, which includes projects in the Holy Land, prior to departure, and resources will be provided to assist with this.

Pilgrims will also need to be able to walk over several days up to 20km's on trails of various terrain with a day pack (our large bags are transported to our hotel each day), and so need a reasonable level of fitness.

Congratulations Marjorie Butcher!


