The sacrament is administered in both kinds. You are welcome to receive in one or both kinds. We ask that you do not intinct (dip) the host.


Finally, this week's poem is by one of my favourite poets, R.S.Thomas. I used this poem for the retreat I lead recently for the clergy of the Diocese of Grafton. Typical of R.S.Thomas' poetry, there is an opening darkness of desolation and despair, fearing an end of time. The reference to Yeats is to the Irish poet W.B.Yeats, and his terrifying beautiful poem '*The Second Coming*'

(https://www.poetryfoundation.org/poems/43290/the-second-coming).The landscape, though Welsh, reminds me of visiting the church on the Cornish coast at Morwenstowe, with the same harshness of sea and cliff and stone at the church's door. The turn of the poem in the final section reminds us that all things have their times and seasons, including prayer. Make a cuppa, and savour this poem.

#### The Moon in Lleyn by R.S. Thomas

The last quarter of the moon of Jesus gives way to the dark; the serpent digests the egg. Here on my knees in this stone church, that is full only of the silent congregation of shadows and the sea's sound, it is easy to believe Yeats was right. Just as though choirs had not sung, shells have swallowed them; the tide laps at the Bible; the bell fetches no people to the brittle miracle of the bread. The sand is waiting for the running back of the grains in the wall into its blond glass. Religion is over, and what will emerge from the body of the new moon, no one can say.

But a voice sounds in my ear: Why so fast, mortal? These very seas are baptized. The parish has a saint's name time cannot unfrock. In cities that have outgrown their promise people are becoming pilgrims again, if not to this place, then to the recreation of it in their own spirits. You must remain kneeling. Even as this moon making its way through the earth's cumbersome shadow, prayer, too, has its phases.

# Music this Sunday



#### Music notes

In today's music we hear works inspired by the grandeur of Cathedral organs. Noble and Durufle, like David Drury, were outstanding organists of their time, and in the work of all three composers we hear the organ at its best. From Durufle's Requiem we hear two sections of extraordinary beauty in which the choral parts are based on Gregorian chant, with the organ providing rich and intricate accompaniments. The harmonies are the best of the French tradition, following composers such as Debussy, Poulenc and Messiaen. Noble's Canticles in b minor are favourites of every choir, again with brilliant organ writing that supports the beautiful harmonies. In the Nunc dimittis be on the lookout for Noble's setting of the 'light to lighten the gentiles', where his subtle use of rise and fall in volume give, at least for me, an impression of the

light from a lighthouse, coming and going as the lighthouse turns on its axis. In the morning service, David Drury's Gloria from the Mass in Honour of Mary McKillup is, again, a brilliant example of organ writing, setting the text to great effect.

An interesting side story to today's music is that Noble and Stanford knew each other and worked together, at least for a time, until the younger Noble tired of Stanford's bad temper! (Stanford was the boss.)





#### Who are we, and what is the Top End Music project?

In October 2023, three musicians from Newcastle, NSW travelled to Bamaga, QLD, to bring and make music with the community. David Banney (violist, composer, educator and Director of Music at Christ Church Cathedral, Newcastle), Rosemary Ponnekanti (flute, piano) and Bianca Ponnekanti (violin) spent five days supported by the Northern Regional Area council, art gallery and College (K-12), and welcomed by the Bamaga community. As we tell the story of our trip, Rosemary will write the words, Bianca will create this site and we'll all contribute to the images. #### Climate Change

Australian Religious Response to Climate Change is campaigning to include Climate Change in our environmental legislation as part of our moral duty to protect the planet and all living things.

Did you know that our present Environmental legislation doesn't mention Climate Change? If it did, it would be difficult to approve any new fossil fuels. Minister Plibersek is reviewing this legislation and will be making an announcement in December in advance of COP 28. We want her to change this legislation to save the planet.

ARRCC would like as many individually written letters as possible sent to Tania Plibersek in November to persuade her to demonstrate that she is serious about climate change. These are more powerful than internet petitions.

The letters only need to be short but they should be in your own words - we are having a letter writing afternoon tea to support each other in this task.

Please come on Tuesday November 14th 4.30 to 6. There will be tea, coffee and cake. I'll bring stamps, envelopes, paper and pens or you can bring your own. You don't need to stay for the whole time. If needed, we will have more than one session. Please pass this message on.

To the Primate, The Most Reverend Geoffrey Smith Bishops of Australia Re: PRAYERS FOR PEACE with silence for one minute at 9.00pm each night.

Dear Archbishop Geoffrey,

The desire to promote peace resonates deeply within the Franciscan Community.

At this time of many horrific wars raging across our world, we as members of the Third Order of the Society of St Francis (tssf) request that our Anglican Bishops encourage the faithful to spend a minute in silence each evening at 9:00pm, praying for peace.

We also request that the practice be promoted during Ecumenical and Interfaith dialogue, with the hope that all peace seeking people unite in sending waves of compassion throughout the world.

The Silent Minute movement began in the United Kingdom during the Second World War, when people would unite at 9:00pm each night in prayer or meditation, according to their beliefs, and willed for peace to prevail. The practice fell away over time and was revived again by the Silent Minute London-based charity after the 9/11 terrorist attack and the ensuing wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The Silent Minute Prayer currently in use is,

'Source of my being, Help me to live in peace, And save my home the planet Earth'.


If the prayer is published in bulletins, newsletters etc., it is requested that the Silent Minute Charity for Peace be acknowledged.


