Finally, this week's poem is about Saint Joseph. Joseph's Feast Day is Tuesday 19th March, and it's important that we give thanks for Joseph, and his parenting of the child Jesus. In the baptistry in the Cathedral, one of the windows depicts a scene, not dissimilar to that described in the poem. As an aside, I adore our Kempe and Co. windows, and the level of detail in them is humbling. If you look closely at the window, you will see that the instruments of the Passion are part of this idyllic domestic scene – much like Sister Kerry describes in this poem.

The Secret of the Wood

When Joseph laid him in the crib
did he feel the splintered wood and shave it,
as a carpenter, to make it smooth?
Did his dreams reveal the cross to him
on which his foster son would lie?
Did he wish to save him from the wood
upon which he would die?
Did he hide his tools of carpentry
when Jesus was a boy, avoiding early crises
that would take away his joy?
Or did Joseph gently teach him to embrace
the level plane and smooth the wood
which eventually would cause him pain?
Did Jesus then embrace him as a son his father would
when Joseph taught him carefully the secret of the wood?
Did Mary kiss the splintered hand as tears clouded her eyes
when Jesus held it up to her to show his boy-hood tries?
Did she tell him to be careful and
to wash it out real well? Did she wish so much to mend it
when his hand began to swell?
Did she call him out of Joseph's shop and tell him
“go and play,” or did she let each moment
help prepare them for that day
when Jesus would embrace the wood rocked in
as a child, the wood he carved, the nails he drove, the trees
created by his word
to save us in his love.



Music notes

Our family recently had the misfortune of being woken at 3am by an alarm at a nearby school, which had malfunctioned and set itself going following storm damage to the electrical circuits. The alarm woke the neighbourhood and continued non-stop for 90 minutes - an ear-worm that none of us will forget in a hurry! In sixteenth-century England, electrically powered alarms being still some way in the future, if there was any need to wake the neighbourhood, either because of an emergency or to get people out of bed on cold, dark mornings, the local band of 'waits' would have been on duty, piercing the silence with the sound of pipes, shawms and other loud instruments. A wait was a musician employed by a town to perform a variety of ceremonial as well as more pragmatic duties, from council events to waking the town. The family names Wait and Wakeman stem from this tradition, which is mentioned as early as 1272, and continued until 1835.


It was into a family of waits that Orlando Gibbons was born in 1583 - his father was a wait in Oxford. Orlando and his three brothers inherited their father's musical skills, but it was Orlando who eclipsed them all, becoming a member of the choir of the Chapel Royal and later organist of Westminster Abbey. By the early 1600s Gibbons established himself as the most important composer in England. Gibbons grew up in a country still coming to grips with the events of the Reformation.

His career coincided with the relatively short reign of James I, following the long reign of Elizabeth I. With the Church of England well established, English rather than Latin was the preferred language for church music, and his beautiful motet, *Drop, drop, slow tears* is a superb example of his skill:

*Drop, drop, slow tears, and bathe those beauteous feet,
which brought from heaven the news and Prince of Peace.*

*Cease not, wet eyes, his mercies to entreat;
to cry for vengeance sin doth never cease.*


*In your deep floods drown all my faults and fears;





This Easter, we welcome you to contribute to the vital work of the Anglican Board of Mission's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mission Grants.

Mission Grants are overseen by the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Commission (NATSIAC).

These are small grants, usually less than \$20,000, which support the ministry and mission of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Recent grants have supported ministries as varied as a women's bible camp in the Northern Territory, school chaplaincy in a Western Australian Aboriginal Community College, teenage pregnancy support in central New South Wales, and help with transport for Aboriginal ministry in the Diocese of Willochra.



The Reverend Canon Auntie Di Langham shared with us the impact that one such Mission Grant has had on her community at Toronto, NSW. Auntie Di is a Buandik woman, the chairperson of the Nikinpa Elders and the Director of Reconciliation at the Newcastle Anglican Diocese.

"I've been the recipient of Mission Grants, and for me, it's probably the only way that we can get funding to do Indigenous ministries. It just means a lot; it takes a worry out of your space when you're trying to organise to have different ministries in your community."

The last grant I got has to do with Indigenous ministries working alongside Toronto Anglican Church. We've been doing what we call campfire ministry, where we hold a service that we call Yinbillikin, which is a local word for 'light the fire'. There are a lot of struggles in our community, so we thought this would be a good word for our ministries.

We start at five o'clock on a Sunday night, and we usually have a meal... a lot of our people here are dependent upon food banks and different charities for food at the moment... we share a meal on the Sunday night so that the kids and the families are fed for the beginning of the week.

We then have a service around a campfire. Yinbillikin has an Indigenous flavour to it, with Indigenous prayers and songs.

We hold Yinbillikin once a month and have between 30 and 40 people come along."

For those who minister, like Auntie Di, the grants are imperative to bring communities together through these unique and culturally inclusive initiatives.

"Without the Mission Grants, we wouldn't be able to run it at all. The grants from ABM have been a seeding of a ministry that can then extend.

ABM has always been really supportive of Aboriginal ministries or ministries for people who are on the fringes of the church."


